New York Stocks

NEW YORK (UPI)—Steels and ironworks led stocks higher today.

The market generally ignored the nationwide steel strike.

Steels were upside leaders most of the session. Gains running to around a point or more appeared in Jones & Laughlin, Lukens, National Steel, U.S. Steel, Wheeling Steel, and Youngstown.

Texas Instruments rose around 6 points at its high in the electronics, where zenith was up more than 3. American Shipbuilding jumped around 4 at its high in its group and Schering was up more than 2 in the drugs.

International Salt spurted more than 8 points in the chemicals, where gains running to a point predominated.

Rails, which will be one of the first industries to feel the steel strike, were lower on balance.

But the day-to-day loss now would be greater since production was running at record levels of 11,600,000 ingot tons of steel a month.

In addition to the steel workers, about one million employees in other industries such as coal, railroading and Great Lakes ore shipping will be affected if the strike continues at length. Fabricators will feel the pinch first, with the nation's automobile industry suffering later.

However, major auto firms in Detroit said they have enough steel stockpiled to carry them well into new car production, and the steel strike will not affect 1960 model car introduction dates.

When the strike began at 12:01 a.m., the steel companies were prepared. They had spent the final hours in the slow and costly process of banking blast furnaces, tapping out open hearths and cooling coke ovens.

Although the walkout began officially at one minute after midnight, there were instances of scattered gun-jumping and premature picketing.

Hit Bricks Early
At the vast Homestead, Pa., works of U.S. Steel, sign-bearing pickets "hit the bricks" shortly before 10:45 p.m.

When asked the reason for premature picketing, Babe Digisio, a picket captain, replied: "When you go to a picnic, you go early to get a table. We, as officers and members of the Steelworkers union, merely are carrying out our obligations."

The earliest gun-jumping was reported Tuesday afternoon at the Trenton, Mich., plant of the McClellough Steel Co. and at U.S. Steel's Tennessee Coal & Iron Division in Birmingham, Ala.

As the night shift men filed out of mills in steel centers across the country, the strike tempo picked up. At Gary, Ind., a steel town described only hours before the strike as "subdued and deserted," about 100 men paraded from a local union meeting to the gates of the U.S. Steel works.

But the brief flurry of excitement soon ended and the crowd dispersed, leaving behind only those assigned to picket line duty. The strike was on.

Rep. Hand Asks Appling To Pay Back 'In Full'

PORTLAND (UPI)—State Rep. Beulah Hand (D-Milwaukie) Tuesday demanded that Freeman Holmer, head of the state department of finance and administration, ask Secretary of State Howell Appling to "reimburse" the state for sending out a news release summary of a speech Appling made in Klamath Falls at a Republican picnic Sunday.

She said the document Appling sent out was a four-page summary of a partisan political speech and charged it was made and distributed at public expense.

In a letter to Holmer, the Milwaukie Democrat declared that the release was written by a paid state employee, was mimeographed on state time and with state materials and was sent out in official envelopes. She added the letters were run through the state's postage metering machine.

She demanded that Holmer request the Secretary of State to "reimburse the state in full."

Fire Destroys Roundup Barn At Pendleton

PENDLETON (UPI)—Fire destroyed a large tack barn containing 40 stalls at the Roundup stadium here Tuesday afternoon.

John E. Batur, Pendleton Roundup president, said the flames apparently spread to the structure as weeds were being burned nearby.

Firemen prevented the blaze from reaching the livestock pavilion and stock pens. The blaze started about 1:30 p.m. and was contained by 2:20 p.m.

Batur said the stalls, used for show horses and other parade animals, probably would be rebuilt for the next Roundup, next September.

No stock or equipment were in the stalls at the time of the fire. A damage estimate was not immediately available.

Batur said the burning of the stalls would not hamper opening of the National Indian Encampment at the Roundup grounds Friday.

S. W. Doane Receives 30-Year Service Pin

S. W. Doane, State Highway Department employee received a service award pin for 30 years service to the department.

The department inaugurated these awards last year and as of July 1, over 1,600 employees will have received awards for 10 or more years of service.

The awards are given in recognition of the importance of these veteran employees to the highway department and to the state.
