Senator Urges More Food Distribution

VIENNA (UPI) — Radio Bucharest Thursday night announced the appointment of George Mahovetz as a new Romanian minister to the United States. Mahovetz succeeds Silviu Brucan who will become the Romanian delegate to the United Nations, the broadcast said.

LONDON (UPI) — Moscow Radio Thursday accused the Shah of Iran of "concealing" from his people the "facts" about United States action to arm Iran. The Persian-language broadcast, monitored here, claimed that the U.S. was "hurriedly" building rocket launching sites in northern Iran and that the Iranian army had been provided with nuclear arms.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Vice Adm. Hyman G. Rickover has said the United States is in no better position today to fight the Russian submarine "menace" than it was to defeat the German submarine threat in 1941. "The great danger we face from Russian submarines is an attack on our country, particularly our coastal cities, by Russian submarines that carry missiles," he said.

HAMBURG, Germany (UPI) — The sixth Socialist International Conference wound up a four-day session here Friday with delegates from 38 nations unanimously calling for an East-West summit meeting. Socialist leaders were split on the issue of disarmament, with the French delegation strongly opposing a British laborite proposal that all nations but the United States and Russia renounce nuclear arms.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The foreign ministers of the 21 American nations will meet in Santiago, Chile, next month on the troubled situation in the Caribbean. The Organization of American States (OAS) unanimously approved the site Friday after Mexico withdrew its objections of Santiago. The Mexicans wanted the meeting to be held in Washington.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Richard L. Neuberger (D-Ore.) Monday urged expansion of this country's overseas surplus food distribution programs. He said the programs have "brought increased demand for grain and fruits produced in and shipped from Oregon."

In a statement submitted to a Senate Foreign Relations Committee hearing on disposal of surplus agricultural commodities, Neuberger said enactment of new legislation would help "turn America's overflowing agricultural storage bins into storehouses of good will."

The senator praised the Oregon Wheat Growers League for its work in Asia under the present short-term surplus food act, Public Law 480. He said the league has "demonstrated clearly to the people of Oregon the humanitarian and economic values which have resulted from the program which its representatives have been able to implement in Japan, South Korea, India and Pakistan."

Neuberger has co-sponsored a "food for peace" measure introduced by Sen. Hubert Humphrey (D-Minn.).

Townsend Club Holds Meeting

PORTLAND (UPI)—The annual convention of Townsend Club members opened here today with about 300 delegates attending.

On hand for the convention was 93-year-old Dr. Francis Townsend who founded the movement for pensions for elderly people in the 1930's.

Dr. Townsend missed the opening of the convention. He was up town buying new frames for his glasses. His son, R. C. Townsend, was temporary chairman.

Dr. Townsend said his movement helped the social security system. But he added that "millions of old people who have given 40 or 50 years service to the nation still find themselves stranded in their old age, because of sickness or other causes."

The present Townsend plan calls for a gross receipts tax of 2 per cent on all income of more than \$250 a month. The revenue would provide an income estimated at between \$130 and \$150 a month for each person more than 60 years old.

Dr. Townsend, who walks with a cane, was presented a citation at the morning session by Mayor Terry Schruck.

STADIUM ROOF PLANNED

MOSCOW (UPI) — Officials said today work on an eight-million-dollar glass roof to cover the 80,000 seats at Dynamo Stadium is scheduled to start next year. The roof will make it possible to hold track meets and stage soccer matches at the stadium during the winter.

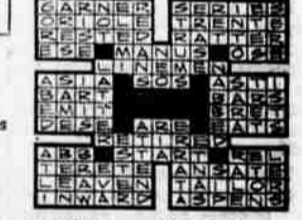
