

# Pendleton Swimmers Upset La Grande In Dual Meet

The Pendleton Swim Club turned the tables on La Grande last night, defeating the Blue Mountain paddlers, 229 to 179, in a dual meet at Pendleton.

The outcome was a reversal of the last meeting of the two aggregations, won by La Grande on July 2, 202 to 181.

The victors took 27 first places, compared to La Grande's 22, and set 11 pool records, as against La Grande's 19 new pool marks.

## Ed Machen Hopes For Title Shot

PORTLAND, Ore. (UPI) — Eddie Machen, who said he would do his talking in the ring, hoped today that he was eloquent enough against Hussein Vargas to earn a shot at the heavyweight championship.

"I'm ready to take on Inezar Johnson in his own back yard," Machen said after blasting Vargas in 1:55 of the sixth round for a technical knockout at the Oregon Centennial Exposition grounds Wednesday night.

Vargas, 195, was sent to his knees for an eight count in that round, but he arose and was plastered against the ropes at Machen's mercy. The referee, Ralph Gruman, stopped the fight at that point.

Vargas blamed the TKO on the lack of a mouthpiece. He said that in the excitement between the fifth and sixth rounds his seconds forgot to put his mouthpiece back in. He was stunned by a series of left and right hooks by Machen.

"But I don't want to blame it on any one thing because I got beat," Vargas said. He said he was "shook up real hard" in the sixth before he went to the canvas.

The two heavyweights fought a close battle through five rounds with Machen, 197, Portland, Ore., scoring more blows but with the Mexican on the aggressive. Vargas plodded forward through most of the bout, stopped only by Machen's occasional outbursts of fury.

It was the 8th pro bout for the fifth-ranked Machen and his 6th win. He had a draw with Zora Foley in 1954 and was knocked out in the first round by Johnson in Sweden last September.

Contributing to the local downfall was the failure of several key contestants to appear.

Bonnie Scott, La Grande diver and winner of the Washington state AAU women's and girls' championships last week at Pasco, was withheld from competition when she struck the bottom of the pool on her face on her first practice dive prior to the start of the meet. She was to be examined today for a possible fractured nose.

Jennifer Smith, La Grande's state champion backstroke, who has never dived in competition, was permitted to dive in Bonnie's place. She placed second to Ruth Horning of Pendleton, the winner.

Pendleton's victory served as notice by the former district champions that they will be a potent force in the Aug. 8 district championships in La Grande.

## Braves Win As Bobby Avila Unloads Homer

One swing of Bobby Avila's bat and Fred Haney can feel the Milwaukee Braves' second-base woes are behind them.

Acquired from the Boston Red Sox only 24 hours earlier, the ex-American League batting champion pulled the Braves out of their seven-game losing streak Wednesday night with a two-run ninth-inning homer that produced a 5-4 victory over the Cincinnati Reds.

The win, the Braves first since July 13, moved them back into third place and also presented Warren Spahn with his 12th victory of the season and the 258th of his career. Spahn went all the way, yielding nine hits and contributing a homer to Milwaukee's seven-hit attack.

The San Francisco Giants, meanwhile, increased their NL lead to 1½ games with a 6-1 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals while the second-place Los Angeles Dodgers bowed to the Chicago Cubs, 7-2. The Philadelphia Phillies crushed the Pittsburgh Pirates, 11-4, in the other game.

**Sox Regain Lead**  
The Chicago White Sox took over first place in the American League by one game when they

shaded the Boston Red Sox, 5-4, and the New York Yankees downed the Cleveland Indians, 6-5. The Detroit Tigers beat the Washington Senators, 6-2, and the Kansas City "A's" downed the Baltimore Orioles, 6-3.

Mike McCormick pitched a six-hitter for the Giants, who snapped a three-game losing streak with a nine-hit attack that included a run-scoring single and a homer by Willie Kirkland.

Earl Averill's grand slam homer was the big blow as the Cubs routed Danny McDevitt with seven runs in the second inning. Bob Anderson turned in his sixth victory, his third over the Dodgers.

**Phillie Pounds Pirates**  
Dave Phillip drove in three runs and Ed Boushock, Harry Anderson, and Joe Lonnett knocked in two each to lead the Phillies' 18-hit attack on Ron Kline and three successors.

The White Sox scored their 21st one-run win of the year when Sherman Lollar's ninth-inning single scored Nelson Fox with the decisive run.

The Yankees rallied from a four-run deficit to deal fireballer Herb Score his eighth defeat and give Duke Maas his eighth win.

## Bevos Edge Phoenix; Solons Regain Lead

Lefty George Brunet of the Portland Beavers broke one of the most spectacular home run streaks in the history of Pacific Coast League baseball in beating the Phoenix Giants 2-1, Wednesday night at Phoenix.

Brunet yielded only five singles and thus kept Phoenix from hitting a home run in its own park for the first time in 43 games. Last time the Phoenix sluggers were stopped was April 23 by the same Portland Beavers.

A wild pitch by relief pitcher Joe Shipley decided the hurling duel. Marshall Renfro had matched Brunet through the first seven innings and was removed for a pinch hitter. In the eighth Shipley uncorked with the bases loaded.

Portland got its only earned run off Renfro on singles by Bob DiPietro, George Freese and Nini Toray in the third. Phoenix scored in the seventh on a scratch single by Bill Wilson, a walk and a solid pinch hit by Owen Friend.

In the winning frame Portland got the advantage of two walks and a single by Freese before the wild pitch.

Freese, with three singles, was

the game's halting star.

The Sacramento Solons exploded for a 13-0 win over Vancouver. The victory dropped the Mounties a game behind the Solons.

Bob Perry, about the only Solon who can qualify as a consistent power hitter, slammed a pair of three-run homers to lead the onslaught. Joe Stanka, who recorded his 12th win of the season to become the PCL's winningest pitcher, also hit a three-run homer in a big seven-run first inning.

Perry's two clouts upped his season homer total to 13 while Stanka's was his second.

A lack of homers highlighted the Phoenix-Portland contest. It was the first time in 43 games the home orchard that the Giants failed to crack at least one homer.

George Brunet, the Beaver flinger, stopped the power-packed Giants on five hits.

A wild pitch by relief pitcher Joe Shipley decided the contest in the eighth inning with the bases loaded. George Freese singled three times to lead the Beavers.

Steve Jankowski hit an inside-the-park homer with two mates aboard to lead San Diego to its win over Spokane.

Don Schaeffer, a 21-year-old righthander, went the route for the Padres and was credited with his first win of the season.

Shortstop Dick Barone hit his eighth homer of the season in the ninth inning to give Salt Lake its 5-4 victory before a crowd of 12,743 kids' night fans at Salt Lake.

Barone's blow broke a 4-4 deadlock. R. C. Stevens hit a two-run blast earlier in the game for the Bees to overcome a Seattle lead.

Ed Bauta won his fifth game against three losses after coming on in relief. Reliever Darrell Martin, the victim of Barone's homer, was the loser.

## Mathews Hurt; Out Indefinitely

MILWAUKEE (UPI) — Milwaukee's losing streak is ended, but the respite could be short for the defending National League champs if third base slugger Eddie Mathews is out for any length of time.

Mathews was a casualty of the Braves' first victory since July 13 Wednesday night when he crashed into the third base bleacher screen in an unsuccessful try for a foul fly. Braves' trainer Doc Foren said the young slugger "will be out indefinitely" — with estimates running as high as 10 days. The injury was diagnosed as a ruptured blood vessel above the right hip.

Mathews is the team's top homer hitter with 29 and second best RBI producer with 70. His absence now could be costly if Wednesday night's sudden victory is the tonic needed to get the Braves back on the track in quest of their third straight pennant.

Squad Bobby Avila, the impetus from the American League playing his first game at second base, delivered the Braves from their seven-game losing streak with a two-run homer in the ninth inning to beat the Cincinnati Reds, 5-4.

Avila had joined the Braves only a few hours before from the Boston Red Sox in a cash deal and is the seventh player used at second base this season by the Braves.
