LONDON (UPI) — R.G. Casey, Australian Minister for external affairs, said Monday night that the Communist rebellion in Laos "could become quite disturbing for Australia." Casey, who arrived in London Monday night for talks with British officials, described Communist activity in Laos and the Chinese infringement of India's borders as part of a "general pattern of Communist probes."

All Shipyards Are Shut Down

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — The few West Coast shipyards still operating in spite of the week-long machinists' strike were closed down Monday by a walkout of Marine carpenters. Carpenters had been working without a contract since July 1. They are asking a 10-cent hourly increase and a one-year contract. Employers have offered seven cents and a two-year contract. Meanwhile, the Pacific Coast Metal Trades Council rejected a shipyard owners' offer for a new contract — and its 11,000 workers were expected to join the walkout. Metal workers already were idled by the machinists' strike.

Police Seeking White Men In Cross Burning

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (UPI) — Police today were seeking two white men in connection with the burning of crosses on six all-white Birmingham area public school grounds Monday night. Several crosses were burned last year on school property, but officials at that time dismissed the burnings as student pranks. Two white men were seen Monday night running to their car from the Jones Valley High School in suburban Powderly where one cross was burned.
