Ex-Marine Given VFW Head Post

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — A former Marine sergeant was a shoe-in to be elected commander-in-chief of the 1,200,000-member Veterans of Foreign Wars today.

Louis G. Feldman, 49, Hazleton, Pa., an attorney, received the only nomination for the post Thursday at the 60th national VFW convention.

Feldman, a Roman Catholic and former district attorney of Pennsylvania's Luzerne County, said one of his first acts, if elected, would be to make a four to five-week tour of Moslem nations in the Near East.

"I'm just going to tell people in those nations that we're the really revolutionary country in the world," said Feldman. "In my opinion, Russia is reactionary."

Also nominated without opposition were T. C. Connell, Killen, Tex., for senior vice commander-in-chief, and Robert E. Hansen, South St. Paul, Minn., for junior vice commander.

Feldman, who served last year as senior vice commander-in-chief, will succeed John Mahan of Montana to the high post.

Compact Cars May Be First In Series Of New U.S. Line

DETROIT (UPI) — The new compact cars to be introduced by the "big three" of the auto industry may be only the first in a series of new types of cars the industry will introduce in the future.

This was the impression left by Henry Ford II, president of Ford Motor Co., Wednesday when he addressed an estimated 1,500 newsmen watching on a closed circuit television network at the first showing of Ford's new compact car, the Falcon.

"One thing seems clear," Ford said. "We are on the way to providing a still wider variety of types, sizes and shapes of automobiles...to meet the varied need of a people of constantly rising standards of living, both at work and play."

He revealed these details of the first American-built compact car to be unveiled by a member of the "big three":

Six-passenger, six-cylinder, 90 horsepower, overhead valve engine, 109.5-inch wheelbase, 181.1 inches long overall, 54.5 inches high, 70 inches wide, 2,366 pounds and capable of 30 miles per gallon "under normal driving conditions."

Ford said no price had been set yet, but talk in the industry has placed the beginning price of the Falcon and its competitors under \$2,000.

Although the interior styling of the car is roomy and typically American, the exterior has a distinctive European flavor. The fender line is curved like a barrel stave, arching up at the center of the car and sloping off at both the front and rear.

It has the traditional Ford "bull's eye" tail lights, and has single headlights on either side of a plain-looking concave grille.

The Falcon, to be introduced to the general public Oct. 8, has a front engine, with the intake manifold and cylinder head cast in one piece of aluminum. The body and frame also are made in a single unit, a technique known in the industry as a "unitized body."

Commission Okays Street Lights At EOC

City commissioners approved a request from Eastern Oregon College for additional street lights in the campus area Wednesday night.

The request for the installation of three new lights and the relocation of a fourth was granted subject to approval of the college on installation charges.

The college proposed the installation of the lights at its expense and the city to assume the monthly charge after installation. An estimate from the California-Pacific Power Company set the cost of installation at \$90.10 per light.

The college would pay the cost to the city to defray operational costs. California-Pacific makes no charge for installation at the city's request, such costs being defrayed over the period of operation by a monthly charge.

The three new lights would cost the city \$3.25 a month each. The estimated installation costs would pay the monthly charge for a period of approximately 30 months.

Car Plunges Off Road; Woman Dies Near Bend
