

White Sox Win, 1-0; May Get Title Today

This could be the day Chicago White Sox fans have been awaiting through 40 long and bitter years.

Ever since the pennant-winning White Sox of 1919 became known as the "Black Sox" because they were charged with "throwing" the World Series against Cincinnati, Chicago fans have dreamed of another title team that would help to erase that unhappy memory.

The dream will come true tonight—if things break right for the Sox.

Chicago can clinch at least a tie for the American League pennant by beating Detroit in an afternoon game. Then the White Sox would become the league champions if second-place Cleveland loses its night game against Kansas City.

The White Sox moved to the threshold of the title Friday night by scoring a typical 1-0 triumph over Detroit on a home run by Sherman Lollar and the five-hit pitching of Bob Shaw.

Cleveland kept its all-but-gone hopes "alive" by whipping Kansas City, 11-2, behind the pitching of Jim Pery. But the Tribe remained 3½ games behind Chicago and the end is in sight.

In other AL games, the Boston Red Sox downed New York, 6-4, and Washington edged Baltimore, 5-3. The big National League showdown between Los Angeles and San Francisco was rained out, and a doubleheader was scheduled for Saturday. In the only NL action, the Chicago Cubs downed Philadelphia, 5-4, in 13 innings.

Shaw and Lollar truly earned heroes' laurels for the White Sox. Shaw allowed only one baserunner to reach third in gaining his 17th win of the year. Lollar provided the game's only run when he slammed his 21st homer.

Bud Daley of Kansas City held Cleveland hitless until Piersall homered to tie the score. Daley then departed during a six-run rally by the Indians in the seventh inning and the Tribe added four more in the ninth.

The Red Sox, who routed Duke Maas in a five-run first-inning rally, carried a 6-0 lead into the last of the ninth inning against the Yankees. But the Yankees scored four runs before Bobby Richardson fouled out with the bases loaded to end the game.

Bill Fischer pitched a five-hitter for the Senators in their win over Baltimore while Jim Lemon led his support with his 33rd homer.

The Cubs beat the Phillies in the 13th inning when Tony Taylor walked, moved to second on George Anderson's error, and scored on Irv Noren's single.

Joe Gordon Quits Job With Tribe

KANSAS CITY (UPI) — Joe Gordon, weary from a running feud with Cleveland general manager Frank Lane, called it quits Friday and refused to say anything about his plans for the future.

Gordon, who announced his resignation as Cleveland manager, reportedly is in line for a similar job at Detroit. When approached on the matter, however, the former Cleveland and New York second baseman replied: "I have not been contacted by any other club."

He appeared chipper in the dugout prior to Friday night's game with the Kansas City Athletics, three hours after he announced that he would not consider taking the job again next year "under any circumstances."

The Cleveland manager had been under fire from Lane because the Indians are not in first place.

"After considerable thought I have decided to announce I would not return to Cleveland as manager next year under any circumstances. The situation has reached a point where it is obvious that harmony cannot be achieved between Frank Lane and myself," Gordon said.

"Upon being informed of Gordon's resignation, Lane said he was certain that Gordon had 'exerted the fullest extent of his ability' as manager of the Indians.

The fiery Cleveland general manager reportedly conferred with Leo Durocher Friday and asked the former Brooklyn Dodger and New York Giant manager "if he was available next year."

Durocher announced Thursday that he was leaving his job with the National Broadcasting Co. It was rumored at that time that he was in line for the Cleveland job, with Gordon shifting to Detroit, and present Detroit manager Jimmie Dykes returning to Pittsburgh as coach.

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Arlington Hands Cove Second Loss

COVE (Special) — Cove suffered their second loss of the season yesterday when the Leopards were downed 30-12 by Arlington.

Arlington scored in every period, twice in the second, while the Cove team pushed across counters in the first and third period.

Outscored by the Arlington team, the Leopards piled up 349 yards offensively. Cove ran for 185 yards and picked up another 164 through the air.

Rich Robinson, 170 pound senior halfback, paced the Leopards in their losing effort. Robinson gained 88 yards in 11 tries from scrimmage and picked up 15 yards on one pass completion in five tries.

Frank Conley, a senior quarterback, who has been out with a sore throat, took to the air 16 times and completed eight for 149 yards.

John Haggerty was on the receiving end of five long-gain passes. The play was a pass-lateral combination with Robinson on the receiving end of the flip. In addition to his running and passing, Robinson caught a pass for 45-yards to set up a score and bulled his way into the end zone for one of the Leopards six-pointers in the third period.

Dave Gassaway was on the receiving end of a Conley pass for 40 yards in the first period.

The Arlington team was paced by the efforts of Pat Barley, who scored three times for Arlington on runs of 25, 30 and 45 yards.

Ed Cox added six points on a plunge and the Arlington center intercepted a pass and returned it 30 yards for the final six points.

Cove Coach Arch Lowry praised Robinson for his outstanding performance. Lowry said that Robinson made almost 80 per cent of the Leopards tackles.

UCLA Holds Purdue To Tie, 0-0

As far as the Purdue Boilermakers are concerned, they can ditch that new-fangled Athletic Assn. of Western Universities and bring back those patties from the Pacific Coast Conference.

For years, Big Ten football teams have been visiting sunny California and thumping PCC schools in the Rose Bowl. But Friday night Purdue—one of the favorites for the 1959 Big Ten title—opened its season at Los Angeles and was held to a 0-0 tie by UCLA.

Purdue was a 12-point favorite but was outplayed by the UCLA defense throughout the game. The heavier Big Ten lads couldn't even score when Purdue guard Fred Brandel recovered a fumble by UCLA tailback Bobby Smith on the home team's seven yard line.

In other top games Friday night, quarterback Jack Jones threw two touchdown passes and scored on a 33-yard run with an intercepted pass to spark Florida to a 30-0 triumph over Tulane. San Jose State edged Denver, 14-13; and quarterback Tony Hanley passed for two touchdowns and ran for another during Detroit's 38-6 rout of George Washington.

Coal Paul Dietzel's Louisiana State Tigers, last year's national champions, also will provide a treat for armchair quarterbacks when they play host to coach Jess Neely's Rice Owls. This clash will be nationally televised at 4:45 p.m. e.s.t. LSU is a 13½ point favorite.

The South has several other top-notching pairings. North Carolina plays host to Clemson in a league game that could go a long way toward settling the Atlantic Coast Conference championship. North Carolina is favored by 4½ points. West Virginia, defending Southern Conference champion, opens at Maryland in a slim, one-point choice.

Texas Christian, Southwest Conference champion, opens at home Saturday night in an interconference clash with Kansas and is favored by 13. Texas is favored over Nebraska by 12 in a South-west afternoon interconference. Colorado plays host to Washington and is a five-point underdog while Oregon is favored by 3½ for its appearance at Stanford and Southern California is a 6½ point pick for its night game with Oregon State in Western features.

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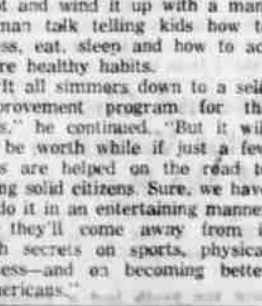
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TOUCHDOWN FOR LA GRANDE

La Grande Twists Bull(dog)'s Tail For 19-0 King's-X Win

La Grande's Tigers grabbed the Bulldog's tail by the tail and twisted it for a 19-0 victory over the Baker team last night.

The Tigers slashed their way through a first half downpour on two sustained drives to put 13 counters on the scoreboard before the half time intermission. After battling through a scoreless third period the Tigers denied the Bulldog end zone again in the final period.

La Grande rolled up 17 first downs to the Bulldog's five and ground out 210 yards on the ground and picked up another 16 through the air for a total of 226 yards.

Baker was unable to penetrate the stubborn Tiger ground defense, picking up only 42 yards on the ground. The Bulldogs had better luck in the air. Passing accounted for 86 of their 163 yard total.

Don Smith put the La Grande team on the scoreboard in the second period with a one-yard plunge. The Tigers had marched from their own territory to penetrate pay dirt. Buck Corey split the uprights with a kick and the Tigers lead, 7-0.

Later in the same period another march paid off for the Tigers when Ray Westenskow fired a slippery pugskin 10-yards into the waiting arms of Corey for another six points. Corey's kick was wide.

Baker came back with determination in the second half and battled the La Grande team to a scoreless standoff. Neither team was able to gain consistently and the ball exchanged hands frequently.

In the fourth period, Jim Cornett sped 15 yards around end to score the Tiger's final six points. The Tigers had put together another long march with Cornett ripping off a 23-yard gainer enroute to the touchdown. The attempted PAT was partially blocked.

Dale Peterson, no stranger to the backfield, picked up 77 yards in 17 tries and was the workhorse of the Tiger offense. Don Smith gained 65 yards in 10 attempts and the speedy Cornett carried only seven times for 55 yards.

Westenskow carried only five times for 22 yards and picked up another 16 yards on two completions in four attempts.

The bright spot in the Tiger show last night was the defensive line led by Laurence Smutz, the 195 pound sophomore guard, who was playing his second varsity game. Franz Haun, the Tiger coach, has worked all through the pre-season drills with special emphasis on what he called his "weak spot."

The Tiger defensive line that included Corey, Smutz, Don Graham and Eric Osterholme runs up and smothered Bulldog runners time after time. Offensively, the four men opened holes for Tiger backs through what was termed a "good Baker team."

Hsun was pleased with the Tigers in their non-counting encounter with the Bulldogs. Next week the fun is over and the Tigers will play in the new intermountain league. Redmond downed Madras 20-6 last night.
