## Rudy Ellis Earns Split Decision

CHICAGO (UPI)—Victor Rudy Ellis and vanquished Roy Calhoun both were disappointed fighters today after a 10-round television bout in which Ellis extended his winning streak to eight bouts. "I wasn't good," Ellis said. "Even if I won, I didn't fight the way I think I ought to fight. I had him twice and let him get away."

It was Ellis' 17th win in 20 pro bouts, and it was Calhoun's eighth defeat in 50 matches. Calhoun, recognizing his edge in experience, was complimentary to his 22-year-old rookie conqueror.

"He's a good defensive fighter," he said, "but that's no excuse. I didn't fight good. I couldn't loosen up. The corner kept telling me to get loose and I tried, but I still was tight all the way."

Ellis, who has knocked out 10 opponents, staggered Calhoun in the third with a flurry with both hands in the final minute, and then he lost his chance for a knockout when Calhoun covered up and dodged away from his blows.

It was a majority decision for Ellis as judge Harold Marovitz scored 46-46 for a draw. Referee Frank Sikora gave Ellis a 50-41 score, giving him every round but one, which he ruled even, and judge Bill Doty made it 46-43 for the winner. The United Press International card was 48-44 for Ellis.

## Frank Howard Selected As Week's Coach

CLEMSON, S.C. (UPI)—He's taken five teams to bowl up in the last 11 years, and may have wrapped up another trip by scoring an upset in the very first game of the season.

That's Frank Howard of Clemson, one of football's all-time great tutors. He is honored today by United Press International as college football's "coach of the week" for Clemson's 20-18 triumph over North Carolina which put Clemson in the driver's seat for the Atlantic Coast Conference championship.

The advance dope on the title fight in the strong ACC tabbed Clemson and North Carolina as co-favorites, with Duke a strong contender. A schedule duke pitted the co-favorites in the opening game of the season.

With Jim Hickey coaching North Carolina in place of the late Jim Tatum, North Carolina was a five-point pick last Saturday on its home field. But Clemson won when it halted Bob Elliott on the two-yard line on a two-point conversion attempt with 80 seconds left.

Howard, the balding, pockish veteran whose reputation as a dinner wit matches his brilliant coaching record, didn't see the game as an upset because "I never entered one yet I didn't think I could win."

And the record shows that Howard always has had a good reason to expect victory. His career total of 107 victories is exceeded by only five other active coaches in the nation — Eddie Anderson of Rice 176, Buddy Butts of Georgia 125, Wal Wilkinson of Oklahoma 114, and Bobby Dodd of Georgia Tech 111.

## Idaho Faces Toughest Schedule In History

MOSCOW, Ida. (UPI)—The University of Idaho Vandals whipped in their first outing by Utah State, face the toughest schedule in their history this fall. But coach Skip Stahley, who has improved Idaho football fortunes so much in his six years here that he received election votes for governor in one election, still is optimistic.

He won't make any predictions about how many games his Vandals will win, but he does say: "We'll be a better offensive team this year. We'll throw the ball better, partly because this season we have adequate receivers."

This theory didn't work out in the 14-0 loss to Utah State, but it would seem there is good material and the Vandals will come up with a few surprises.

The "adequate receivers" include one veteran end, Jim Norton, who caught 15 passes for 188 yards last year and topped the nation with nine pass interceptions, which he returned for 217 yards.

A pair of letterman halfbacks were converted to ends during spring practice and Stahley was pleased with both Paul Wager and Hal Fisher. Reg Carolan, a 6-6, 220-pound sophomore, is another bright spot.

Three returning lettermen are available at quarterback, including seniors Gary Farnworth and Joe Espinoza and junior Sil Vial. All three can run or pass.

But otherwise, the team lacks depth. Only 14 lettermen returned from last year's team that won four and lost five.

Although Stahley believes his team, playing from the spread-T, will hold up well on offense, he's worried about defense, except at the tackle positions. There he has senior Jim Prestel, who is 6-5 and weighs 245. Prestel has been drafted by Cleveland Browns.

## Coaches Set Plans For Weekend Tilts

EUGENE, Ore. (UPI)—The University of Oregon Webfoots were slated to go through another lengthy practice session today in preparation for Saturday's contest with Utah.

Coach Len Casanova had the squad work out on Hayward Field Wednesday to give his ball carriers a chance to run on the same turf they will be playing on against the Redskins. Equal time was spent on defense and offense.

SALT LAKE CITY (UPI)—Utah Coach Ray Nagel today welcomed news that a dry field was expected at Eugene, Ore., Saturday where his Redskins meet the Oregon Webfoots in an intercollegiate football game.

Utah worked out briefly today and will fly to Eugene Friday noon.

CORVALLIS, Ore. (UPI)—The Oregon State Beavers concentrated on offense Wednesday, using the same backfield that started against Southern California last Saturday.

Coach Tommy Prothro said Dainard Paulson would open at tailback against Texas Tech this Saturday, with Jim Stinnette at fullback, Ron Miller at wingback and Derald Swift at blocking back.

PULLMAN, Wash. (UPI)—Coach Jim Sutherland of Washington State has moved sophomore Mel Melin into the number one quarterback slot as part of a wholesale lineup juggle.

Sutherland said he was also trying out sophomore George Reed at fullback, junior Ed Shaw at right end and junior Jim Grieg at tackle, replacing Ted Gao, La Roy Rath and Garner Ekstrand, respectively. Senior Mike Agee has been holding down the quarterback position.

The Cougars received bad news Wednesday when it was learned that Marv Nelson, senior center and a mainstay in the line, will be out of Saturday's game against San Jose State because of a pulled chest muscle.

MOSCOW, Idaho (UPI)—Coach Skip Stahley of the University of Idaho said today that he expected to make some lineup changes for the Washington game Saturday.

Three members of the Vandals' first unit were still on the injured list. Quarterback Gary Farnsworth suffered an arm injury Wednesday but is expected to open against the Huskies. However, halfback June Hanford and fullback Lee Shellman were listed as doubtful starters for the Washington contest.

SEATTLE, Wash. (UPI)—The Washington Huskies concentrated on working against Idaho's offensive and defensive passing formations Wednesday.

Coach Jim Owens said his players were connecting well on their passes against the Vandal defense, but added that the Idaho offense was moving equally well against the Huskies.

STANFORD, Calif. (UPI)—Coach Jack Curtice of Stanford named a 37-man traveling squad today for the Wisconsin game this weekend.

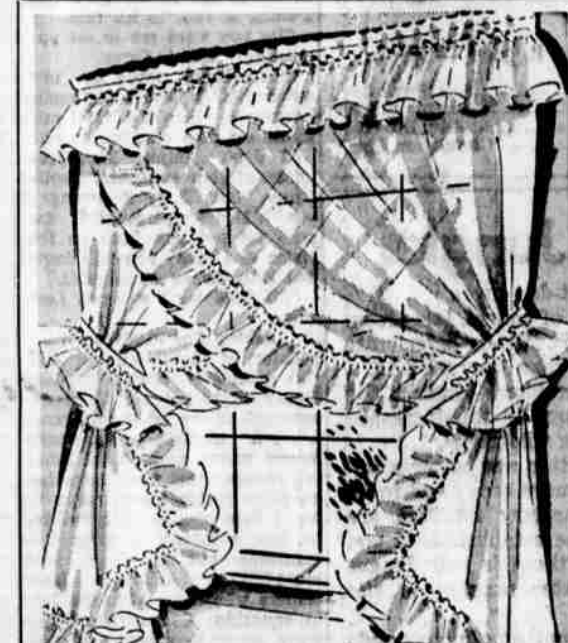
