NEW YORK (UPI)—Stocks moved higher on a broad front today, extending Wednesday's first gain in five sessions from 1 to 2 points.

The rise reflected a technical recovery from the recent lows rather than any particular news item. The steel strike and tight money continued to keep pressure on the market.

Blue-chip industrials scored good gains as a group for the first time in a while DuPont rose 2 in the chemicals, International Paper 2 1/2 in the papers, Reynolds Tobacco 1 in its group, Texaco 1 in the oils, Westinghouse 1 1/2 in the electricals, and Youngstown a point in the steels.

Electronics again were good with IBM and Litton both up under 2 1/2. Vick paced drugs higher with a 2 1/2-point gain. Motors firmed. Other individual features included Polaroid up 3, Celanese up 1 1/2, U.S. Steel up 1, Thiokol up 1 1/2 and Bendix up 1 1/2.

Hurricane 'Gracie' No Threat To U.S.

MIAMI (UPI)—The U.S. Weather Bureau here said today that Hurricane Gracie's 85-mile-an-hour winds "offer no serious threat" to U.S. coastal areas if she continues her slow northwesterly movement.

The season's seventh tropical storm was located at 11 o'clock Wednesday night about 190 miles east-northeast of Nassau, Bahamas and 460 miles due east of Miami. She was moving at about seven miles per hour and was expected to keep the direction for the next 18 to 24 hours.

This course would take the center 75 to 100 miles northeast of the island of Abaco in the Bahamas sometime today.
