

EOC Plots To Stop Coyote Passing Attack Saturday

Coach Arch Dunsmoor's Mountaineer squad will have their work cut out for them when Eastern Oregon College plays host to the College of Idaho in La Grande Saturday night.

The Coyotes will come to town led by Charlie Alvaro, one of the top passers in small college circles last year, and a big, rugged forward wall.

"Our big concern will be stopping Alvaro's passing," commented the EOC mentor. The EOC defensive unit held the veteran Whitman team to 157 yards rushing last week but gave up 71 yards through the air to another needle-threading quarterback Robin Beck.

Another thing that bothers RICHARD SIGNS AGAIN MONTREAL (UPI) — Maurice (Rock) Richard, hockey's greatest goal-scorer, has signed with the Montreal Canadiens for the 18th straight season. The Stanley Cup champions also received signed contracts from defenseman Tom Johnson and right wing Bernie Geoffrion.

Dunsmoor is the weight advantage the Coyotes will have when the two teams clash. The Coyotes will average just a hair over 187 pounds for the team to 182 plus for the Mountaineers.

Up front, where it counts, EOC will be giving away 15 pounds to the man. The C of I line will average 199 pounds to EOC's 184. Big man in the Coyote line will be 216-pound tackle Jerry Ball. Bob Salter at 218-pounds will be the Mountaineers' biggest man.

The Coyote backfield will weigh some 12 pounds less than Eastern's 179 per man average. John Willmarth, 200-pound fullback from La Grande will bear the brunt of the attack on the Coyote line with George Aliverti providing the outside speed. Jerry Williams at 185 pounds is big enough and fast enough to go through the line or around end.

Dunsmoor was all smiles Wednesday as the sun came creeping through the rain and overcast that has blanketed La Grande for the last week. A wet field will be an advantage to the heavier Coyote line and also cut into the effectiveness of the EOC running offense.

Deer Permits Available In Northeastern Oregon Game Control Units

Oregon deer hunters who haven't applied for unit permits are advised they are still available in about half of the game management units. Unfilled units are located primarily in the eastern part of the state, down the Willamette valley and central Oregon Coast.

Nine units in Northeastern Oregon are still open as of Sept. 21. Baker unit has 355 permits; Chesnutt 236; Innaha 282; Keating 415; Lookout Mt. 621; Northside 545; Sled Springs 137; Walla Walla 96; and Wenaha 428.

Hunters wishing to apply for the either-sex deer permits should see the license agents.

Controlled season tags are also available in the Wallowa and Snake river pack areas. The Wallowa pack has 311 tags and the Snake River pack 284, as of Sept. 21.

Fee Must Be Submitted

A fee of \$5 must be submitted for the controlled season tags and applications are accepted on a first-come, first-served basis.

Hunters who want a copy of the 1959 upland game bird and waterfowl rule book can pick them up at all license agencies. The book covers seasons, bag limits and open areas for the taking of all species of upland birds and waterfowl.

Shooting Time-table Included

In the synopsis has been rounded out to the nearest five-minute mark instead of odd minutes as in the past. The new system will make it easier for hunters to determine the proper shooting time for each day's hunt.

The waterfowl season will begin on Oct. 7 and shooting time will begin at noon. Upland game bird season starts Oct. 10 and starting time will be 8 a.m.

A 10-minute film, "Care of Big Game Meat," is available for showing before sportsman's clubs, civic groups and other organizations through the Game Commission.

Joining Carman in the backfield will be steady Ray Westenskow at the quarterback spot, Cornett and either Don Smith or Dale Peterson.

The line will be the same that started the first two games for the Tigers. Gary Voruz will start at the center spot with Laurence Smutz and Eric Osterholm at the guards. Don Graham and Ron Coleman will be at the tackles and the flanker spots will be filled by Buck Corey and Dennis Spray.

Alex Miteff Favored In Friday Bout

SYRACUSE, N.Y. (UPI)—Alex Miteff, whose three straight wins might classify him as a "hot heavyweight," was a 12-5 favorite to beat little known "Sweet" Billy Hunter in tonight's scheduled 10-round television bout at the War Memorial Auditorium.

Miteff, 24, of Maria Teresa, Argentina, will be making his second appearance in Syracuse, a city which thus far has been his personal Waterloo.

The South American brought a 12-fight winning streak here in October 1957. At the time he was hailed as another Luis Firpo, especially in light of his 126-11-3 amateur record.

Such talk dwindled rapidly after Mike De John of Syracuse knocked him out in the first round. His fortunes ebbed sharply but his current win streak has returned him to national ranking among the heavyweights.

Hunter, 26, is a protégé of Sugar Ray Robinson, which may account for his nick name of "Sweet Billy." In contrast to Miteff's wide-in-and-slug style, Hunter relies on a sharp counter-punching attack.
