## Wallowas Hold 'Fascination' For Student Of Indian Lore

The rains came and with them went the plans for another horse-back ride into the Wallowas. Now we'll just have to wait for next summer to continue exploring the magnificent beauty of the mountains.

A few hardy souls — mostly hunters — will travel the trails into the high country to try their luck at bagging a deer or an elk. For the rest of us, it may be quite a spell before we venture out.

But the winter won't be wasted. We'll look at the pictures we took this summer and plan the trips for next year. We'll read the history of the region and learn about the pioneers who first settled the Grande Ronde and Wallowa valleys.

This is an area rich in history. The struggle of the pioneers against the storms of winter, the trouble with Chief Joseph's band of Nez Perce in the Wallowa Valley. And the eventual triumph of the white man over the storms and the Indians.

**Loved the Valley**

It is not at all difficult to understand why Chief Joseph was willing to fight for the valley he loved. "The Land of Winding Waters," the chief called it. He never gave up hope that the valley would be returned to his people. His hope was never realized. The white man was firmly entrenched and the government rejected the old Chief's claim, just as it seems to have been.

The Wallowas are the same today as they were when the Nez Perce summered their herds of famous horses at the foot of Wallowa Lake.

There are more people in the valley now and boat docks mark the edge of the lake where the proud Nez Perce once fished.

**Primitive Beauty**

The Wallowas have retained their primitive beauty despite the coming of civilization. For the white man, too, was impressed with the granite crags, steel blue waters and rich forests.

There is a lodge at the lake and some cabins and homes, but they fit into the surroundings. And the mountains that rise from the lake still seem to ring with the sound of Indian chants and dances.

A dozen trails from the lake beckon to the rider and hiker. They lead to other lakes, nestled high in the mountains. Filled with trout, they are fed by streams only 30 minutes from the snow fields on the mountains above.

This is a great country. We just discovered it. In the years to come we want to see more of this place where a once mighty people lived, and fought, and were defeated because they loved it.

And I think we feel at least a little of what the settlers felt. We don't condone the way they gained possession, but we understand why they wanted it.

### Huge Crowd Welcomes Dodgers At Airport

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—About 4,500 baseball fans — the largest crowd ever to greet a sports team at International Airport — turned a tumultuous welcome to the weary Los Angeles Dodgers as they arrived home Monday night from Milwaukee.

The players, looking haggard and exhausted after the long journey, went from the plane to waiting buses. A Dodger spokesman said they had to be in uniform by 10:30 a.m. so were forced to hurry to bed.

But some of the players found time for comments.

"I'm more nervous now than I was on the mound," said Monday's winning pitcher, Larry Sherry, as he gazed over the heads of the crowd.

The Dodger special was expected to land at 10 p.m. but turbulent weather delayed the arrival until 12:30 a.m. However, the fans lost none of their enthusiasm as they continued to whoop it up in an orderly fashion.

Remnants of their days in Brooklyn greeted the Dodgers as
