TELEVISION IN REVIEW: Gary Moore Shows Old Pro Stuff In Fall Video Opener

NEW YORK (UPI) — That friendly, ploddingly pleasant winter replacement for Andy Williams, the Gary Moore Show, returned to CBS-TV Tuesday night.

While Moore isn't going to match the inventiveness and excitement generated by the Williams gang during the summer, it is obvious that Moore can match anyone around when it comes to a knowing, professional, big league production. This was evident in the premiere, which I saw at a screening because of the show's conflict with Bing Crosby's special.

Garry's cohorts, Marion Lorne and Durward Kirby, had more to do than in past shows and were on-target with their material. Special guests were Gertrude Berg, Vic Damone and Jane Powell, all of whom were entertaining in their special ways, but I was sorry that Miss Lorne and Miss Berg didn't have a tete-a-tete.

A new feature on the show is "Candid Camera," where unsuspecting people are put through the wringer by Moore & Co. while a hidden camera records their befuddlement. Practical jokes will get laughs, of course, but there is a touch of anguish in the experience that is not funny. I prefer untainted comedy.

A notable summit meeting occurred on ABC-TV Tuesday night as Bing Crosby, Frank Sinatra, Peggy Lee and Louis Armstrong blended their talents in a show called, "The Bing Crosby Show."

It was a ring-a-ding-dong-dandy hour.

All stood and performed their songs with overpowering style, feeling and happy tones. It was enjoyable and refreshing. Although an effort was made to give these entertainers an imaginative decor of glass knick-knacks, the music was what made the show. If I had to pick pet numbers, I'd choose Sinatra's "Willow Weep for Me," Armstrong's "Mack the Knife," all of Peggy's numbers, and the few numbers that Bing performed.

Of course, a meeting of Bing and Frank also serves to advise us of the latest "in" conversational devices. Unfortunately, their chit-chat Tuesday night produced no new fetishes, only a sordid plug for a chain of health clubs and poorly-timed Sinatraisms about motel living. The lad does seem to be enjoying his bachelor status.

Max Shulman's new series, The Many Loves of Andy Hardy...oops; I mean Dobie Gillis, starring Wayne Hickman, went through the usual saccharine teen-age nonsense in its CBS-TV debut Tuesday night. The highlight was a satire on crime movies, in which a lawman said, "Take that, you loathsome criminal types." If the rest of the show could rise even to this satirical level, it might be worthwhile. Unfortunately, the impression is that we're supposed to care about Dobie and his tiresome love life. Must we? (No, Virginia, it isn't true that Dobie is based on Frank Sinatra.)

The Channel Swim: Person To Person, which returns to CBS-TV on Friday, Oct. 16 with visits to Jack Webb and Mae West, is moving its entire production staff from New York to Hollywood in order to visit more than one screen star a month, as it did under its old budget. NBC-TV's Jack Paar will be Jack Benny's guest star on Sunday, Nov. 29 over CBS-TV. George Bernard Shaw's "Misalliance," starring Robert Morley and Kenneth Haigh, is CBS-TV's Playhouse 90 production for Thursday, Oct. 29.

Sheldon Reynolds will turn out the Desilu Playhouse's first foreign-based drama, "Thunder in the East" in Tangiers and Rome. Filming starts in November. Jack Benny Leaves Old Spot Sunday Night After 25 Years

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Jack Benny is emigrating from his familiar Sunday night time slot (CBS 7:30 p.m.) for the first time in his 25 years on the air. The blue-eyed 39-year-old, like Steve Allen, found the going too rough against "Maverick," and moved to the 10 p.m. hour. Allen bugged out entirely, switching to Monday nights, leaving Ed Sullivan to battle it out with the popular Western series.

"Sure, we will lose some viewers who don't stay up late, but at least our audience won't be in the middle of eating dinner," Jack said Sunday and Monday nights are the best TV times available, explaining that most people stay home on Monday as evidence by poor theater and restaurant business.

"Sunday is a good day because of its importance. It affords a definite break in the living pattern of the public," he said.
