The leading jockey at Long acres in 1957 and 1958, Porter books spinning platters for a radio station in Sunnyside, Wash., last December. He figures to resume doing it but in the meanwhile is giving two-buck bettors their share of thrills at Golden Gate Fields.

And now hear this, you kids in the duck-tail haircuts. Although only 21, Pepper is a staunch foe of "rock-a-billy" rhythms and prefers the swing music which was in vogue before his birth.

Pepper feels that his "double life" helps retain his refreshed viewpoint.

"After I've been riding a while I like to go back to playing records, reading commercials and giving the news," the wiry Porter says.

Like all veteran jockeys, Porter has witnessed spills and hurt his back in one this summer at Longacres.

"Sure a guy's heart flutters a little when he sees some riders going down in front of him and the rest of the field trying to go around them," Porter says. "But it's part of the business."

And he also has witnessed flare-ups in the jockeys' room when one rider has swung on another just after a hot race.

"But the same thing happens in the business world," Porter says. "It's all part of making a living."

Ralph Dupas To Battle Rudell Stich

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (UPI)—Ring-wise Ralph Dupas pits his speed against older but less experienced Rudell Stich's damaging right hand tonight, hoping to earn a shot at Don Jordan's welterweight title.

Bill King, Louisville promoter of the nationally televised ABC bout said he has offered Jordan \$75,000 to meet the winner of tonight's bout here within 90 days.

For Dupas the possible title shot was the major incentive, but Stich needed a victory badly to recoup prestige lost when he dropped a disappointing split decision to Luis Rodriguez here last August.

Hockey League Opens 43rd Season Today

The National Hockey League, which enjoyed its best season ever last year, begins its 43rd year of operation Wednesday night with the New York Rangers meeting the Black Hawks in Chicago.

Thursday night the four-time Stanley Cup champion Montreal Canadiens open their bid for a third straight league pennant against Boston at the Montreal Forum. And on Saturday all six teams are in action. New York will be at Boston, Detroit at Montreal and Chicago at Toronto.

The NHL, the major league of hockey, has shown an annual attendance increase of 70,000 patrons for the past three years. President Clarence Campbell told United Press International "there is no reason why we shouldn't show at least a similar increase this season."

Some 2,500,000 hockey fans turned out last year and the league expects to top three million in 1959-60.

Black Tornado Rages Across Prep Poll

PORTLAND (UPI)—The raging Black Tornado of Medford continued in first place today in this week's Oregon Journal Coaches Poll of state A-1 prep football powers.

Medford again took seven of eight votes for first place, a total of 79 points. Jefferson remained in second place and Pendleton claimed 62 points and moved into third.

In the A-2 poll, Vale remained in the No. 1 spot with 77 points and Willamina took a firmer hold on second place.

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Legal Department Aids Famous Nude

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Justice Department has come to the aid of a famous nude.

It declared in federal district court that the Post Office Department was wrong in banning postal cards bearing reproductions of Francisco Goya's famous portrait, "The Naked Maja," from the mails.

United Artists Corp. mailed 2,000 of the cards to theatre owners, critics and press agents last July to publicize a movie about the life of the 18th Century Spanish artist.

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
