Tail-End Indians To Test La Grande

It's another comeback weekend for the La Grande Tigers following their loss last Friday to Pendleton. The Tigers play host to the Intermountain league tail-end club, The Dalles, on the local field tomorrow night.

The Indians will come to town Friday with an 0-3 league record and an over-all record of 1-4. The Dalles only win was over WyEast in their second game of the season, 31-6. The Dalles dropped their opener to a powerful Gresham team, 7-0.

In league play, Pendleton dropped the Indians 26-6. Hermiston outscored them 18-6; and Redmond kept its winning record in-

act by dropping them last week 12-6. The Dalles was well contained by the Panthers in their last outing. The longest sustained march the Indians were able to generate was 25 yards. Penalties played a big part in holding The Dalles fourth quarter comeback. Officials stepped off 60 yards in penalties in a hapless, disorganized fourth period.

Twice in the final frame penalties moved the Indians back to their own four-yard line. An illegal use of hands call erased a 60-yard pass play from quarterback Chuck Kelley to halfback Dave Lacoek and kept the Indians in a hole.

During the week, the Tigers have been working lightly to give the aches and pains received in the Buck clash a chance to wear off before Friday's game. La Grande came through the game with only minor bruises. Ray Westenskow, who went out for one play following a twisted ankle he received while throwing a block, will be ready for full time action against The Dalles.

La Grande is now almost out of title contention barring major upsets of Redmond and Pendleton. Coach Franz Haun will attempt to lift the blue-clad Tigers to the 500 mark in conference play for the second time this season.

The Tigers will use their revitalized defense to halt the passes of Kelley and the end sweeps generated by Lacoek. La Grande's defense has given up only 33 points in five contests, 27 last week against Pendleton.

Imbler Rolls Over Umapine

IMBLER (Special) — Jim Beck ran the opening kickoff back 66 yards for a touchdown as Imbler defeated Umapine 62-8 in a six man football game at Imbler yesterday.

Beck scored three times in the one sided win, Bob Brookshire twice and Merrill Gorham twice. Darryll Gorham added a single six pointer and Dave Pearl, Imbler's 200-pound center, also scored a touchdown.

Beck, Brookshire, Pearl also added extra points in the contest.

Umapine's lone score came with less than two minutes remaining in the game. Douglas Fox ran 65 yards to the four-yard line and Hari Krumbah danced over for the score. The field goal was good for the extra points.

Imbler made 13 first downs enroute to 413 yards during the game. The ground attack accounted for 354 yards and 39 came from passing.

Beck scored on runs of 60, 65 and two yards; Brookshire galloped 24 and two yards; Darryll Gorham ran 16 yards and Pearl caught a pass from Joe Westenskow for 16 yards and a TD. Merrill Gorham caught passes from Westenskow for 29 yards and 15 yards for touchdowns.

Beck accounted for 203 yards of the rushing total and Brookshire 103 to account for all but the 40 yards rushing picked up Imbler.

The Eastern Oregon Mountaineers have been drilling under the direction of Don Campbell while Dunsmoor remained in Klamath Falls with Dennis Bagnall who was hospitalized following last week's game with a broken collar bone.

The Mountaineers have spent the first part of the week on all phases of passing. The search for a defensive halfback to replace the injured Bagnall was the top item on the agenda as Campbell

concentrated on defense in Tuesday's passing drill.

The EOC running game, which bettered the vaunted Owl attack, was worked on Wednesday night as the Mountaineers prepare for Saturday's game with the high flying Wenatchee Junior College team.

Wenatchee currently boasts a 4-0 record for the season and is considered the team to beat in the Washington JC loop. Wenatchee dropped Yakima JC 14-0 in their last outing.

The Mountaineers haven't any scouting reports on Wenatchee but Dunsmoor says that indications are they are a good ball club. The Wenatchee roster is filled with Hawaiians and Canadians and should provide EOC with an interesting challenge.

Chicago Places Four Men On League All-Star Team

NEW YORK (UPI) — Luis Aparicio and Nelson Fox, the Chicago White Sox' brilliant double play combination, were unanimous choices today on a United Press International 1959 American League All-Star team that does not include a single New York Yankee.

Two other members of the American League champions — pitcher Early Wynn and catcher Sherman Lollar—were named to the team which also included pitcher Cal McLish, outfielder Rocky Colavito and first baseman Vic Power of the Cleveland Indians, outfielders Al Kaline and Harvey Kuenn of the Detroit Tigers and third baseman Frank Malzone of the Boston Red Sox.

Mickey Mantle, who received eight votes for an outfield position and Yogi Berra, who got two for

catcher, were the only Yankees among the total of 29 players receiving at least one vote. The team was picked by a 24-man committee of baseball experts, three representing each city in the league.

The eight regulars had a composite .291 batting average and totaled 136 homers during the season. Wynn posted a 22-10 record and a 3.13 earned run average while McLish had a 19-8 slate and a 3.64 e.r.a.

Wynn, whose 271 victories make him the biggest winner among active major league pitchers, also was a unanimous choice of the committee. Lollar received 18 votes, and Power, Malzone, Kaline and Cuavito had 16 each. McLish got 11 and Kuenn won the third outfield berth with 10.
