Five Persons Killed In Collision Of Two Automobiles

MOUNTAIN VIEW, Calif. (UPI)—Five persons were killed and five others seriously injured Sunday night when two cars collided head on in heavy Sunday traffic on the Eayshore Highway.

The dead were tentatively identified as Nancy Pollington and her daughter Kay, 7, of San Lorenzo; Gerald Loftus, 30, and his wife, Margaret, 29, Mountain View; and Jean Froberg, San Francisco.

Seriously injured were Scott Loftus, 6; William Froberg, 27; Graham Pollington; Fred Inkila, 38, and Lillian Inkila, 40.

The California Highway Patrol reported that a car containing the Frobergs and the Inkilas apparently crossed the center line of the four-lane, undivided highway and crashed head-on into a station wagon carrying the Loftus and Pollington families.

The car overturned and caught fire from the force of the collision, but passing motorists righted the flaming car and pulled its four occupants out.

Roman Cardinal Dies

ROME (UPI)—Federico Cardinal Tedeschini, archpriest of St. Peter's Basilica, died today. He was 66.

Cardinal Tedeschini died at 8 a.m. (11 p.m. e.s.t. Sunday). Vatican sources said death was caused by an intestinal occlusion.

Tedeschini was elevated to the rank of cardinal in 1955 by Pope Pius XI and served as pastor of St. Peter's from the time of his consecration until his death.

As the year is drawing to a close, we of the La Grande exchange would like to give you a kind of "annual report" on the accomplishments we have made during 1959.

GROWTH:



In the first eight months of this year we added 42 new subscribers. That brings the total number of telephones to 4388 in the La Grande Exchange. In order to add those 42 new phones, we have actually installed or removed about 300 telephones.

PAYROLLS, 1959

We now have 57 regular employees in the La Grande area. By the end of the year these people will have earned about \$232,288.00 in salaries. These are local salaries, most of which are spent right here for goods and services.

WEST COAST OWNERSHIP:

You might be interested in knowing who owns West Coast Telephone. A recent analysis showed there are a total of 7114 owners of common stock in the company. 2110 of these are men, 3197 are women, 1662 are joint-accounts held by husband and wife together, and 145 are institutions or firms. 95% of the shareholders in our company live in Washington, Oregon or California.



MAJOR PROBLEMS OF 1959:

This exchange has been confronted with three major problems during the year. The first has been the rapid growth of the area and the ever increasing demand for service. Currently—through our expansion and improvement program—we are keeping pace with the demands for new service.

The second problem has been in the area of rising costs. This year it has cost us about \$1175.00 to add one new telephone to the exchange. In 1950 the cost was approximately \$200.00. We are doing everything in our power to keep costs down and will continue efforts in this field during the years to come.

The third major problem-area has been in relation to party lines. We are working with every available resource to "up-grade" the service and we urge you to remember to keep your calls brief and space your calls so that incoming calls can get through. Remember, the call that comes through may be for you.

PLANS FOR 1960:

Our construction, expansion and improvement program for the La Grande exchange will continue through 1960 and beyond in order to keep up with the growth of this dynamic area. We of West Coast are proud to be able to play a part in this growth... and we pledge continued improvements in order to bring this community telephone service as fine as is available anywhere in the nation.
