

# Mounties Travel For Grays Harbor Tilt And Fourth Win

Coach Arch Dunsmoor cast his eye on a 4-5 season's record after Eastern Oregon College 144 won over Westminster Saturday at Salt Lake. A change in personnel helped spark the Mounties to their third win of the season.

Rick Larson and Gene McKinney came off the bench to score a touchdown apiece and brighten the picture for the Mounties. Larson, a third string half back galloped five yards in the first period for a touchdown and McKinney, a wide receiver, sneaked over from a yard out to provide the clincher.

Larson is a freshman from Sisters and was a member of the Shrine East B squad football team. McKinney played only one game for Dunsmoor before a knee

injury brought the potential stars budding careers to a halt. The knee is still not whole and McKinney avoids running unless it's required.

The location that started the Westminster home was operating together for the first time this season. In addition to McKinney and Larson, Sam Clark and John Willmarth opened for EOC. Dunsmoor plans to go with much the same crew in next Saturday's night test against Grays Harbor JC in Aberdeen, Wash.

The defense which EOC has lacked so much of this year turned out for the better. Larry Snook and Chuck Becker, a couple of freshmen ends, moved into the defensive backfield and helped hold the Westminster passing attack to two completions in 10 attempts. Snook is from Wallawa and Becker from Vale.

Dunsmoor's defensive line also put an inspired goal line stand early in the third period. The Parsons had a first and goal on the five yard line but failed to score.

Dean Fowler and Ray Porter were singled out for their performance on both offense and defense against the Parsons. Center Bill McCadden played a good offensive game, according to Dunsmoor. Wopple May, a transfer from Columbia Basin JC, made his first appearance in a EOC uniform and was credited with an outstanding game. May is from Pilot Rock.

There is little information on the EOC campus about next week's opponent. The Mounties trimmed Grays Harbor 20-13 last year and will be out to make it two in a row over the JC team.

Dunsmoor will continue to experiment with his team for next week's game. The possibility that Dean Whitely will be the starting fullback in a backfield that includes Clark, Larson and McKinney is good.

Willmarth and May will play at guard along with Jim Neese and Daryl Corey. Salter and Kerfer will be the tackles and Phil Miller and Chuck Hughbanks at the ends.

# George Altonburg Regains 1st Spot At Jr. Rifle Club

George Altonburg moved back into top spot in the La Grande Junior Rifle Club competition last night but a new challenger joined the ranks.

Carroll Bruce finished with a 345 to trail Altonburg by three points in the final tally. Karen Fitzgerald also fired a 345 to finish in a tie for second place with Bruce.

The three shooters were the only entries to compete in all four positions.

Fitzgerald fired a 97 in the prone position to Bruce's 95 and Altonburg's 93. The winner fired a 96 sitting while Bruce picked up 91. Fitzgerald came back to win the kneeling position with 99 points. Altonburg had an 85 and Bruce an 80.

Altonburg won the match from the standing position. He shot a 74 while Fitzgerald, who usually tops the field standing, managed only a 68. Bruce fired an 80 standing.

Tom Leng with a 93 prone and an 80 sitting finished third.
