Vegas Show Stars Leave For Japan In Operation Typhoon

HOLLYWOOD (UPI)—Ten top stars left for Las Vegas today to perform in a benefit show for victims of last month's typhoon catastrophe in Japan.

Titled "Operation Typhoon," the show will star Dean Martin, Donald O'Connor, Gene Kelly, Zsa Zsa Gabor, Vic Damone, Lucille Ball, Burl Ives, Debbie Reynolds and Ernie Kovacs.

The driving force behind the project is Shirley MacLaine, whose husband, Steve Parker is producing the all-star revue.

Parker flew in from Japan last Monday and will return to Tokyo Thursday with the proceeds from the benefit.

"This show is front-page news in Japan and one of the best international relations projects to come along in some time," Parker said. "But it's not just a stunt."

"I live and work in Japan six months of every year, and I was down in southern Japan right after the typhoon struck. It killed some 6,000 people and left a million and a half Japanese homeless and hungry. I cried like a baby seeing those poor people so utterly desolated."

Two days after the typhoon Red China—which has no diplomatic relations with Japan—shipped in 400,000 bushels of wheat to Japan. So far, our government has done nothing to help."

Parker and his friends hope to raise \$70,000 at the benefit—charging \$50 a seat for the show at the New Frontier Hotel, which holds 900 people. Much of the money will be raised at an auction following the stage show.

Works in Japan

"Shirley and Dean Martin will auction off Japanese heirlooms, Samurai swords, kimonos and a vacation trip to Japan by plane."

"The money will be given directly to our ambassador, Douglas MacArthur II, who will then present it to the Japanese government," Parker said.

Russian Exchange Students Say Two Countries Similar

(EDITOR'S NOTE: Russian exchange students on a 30-day tour of the United States are spending this week end in Philadelphia. A UPI reporter tells us in the following dispatch about his experience with one of their leaders.)

PHILADELPHIA (UPI)—In seeking out Soviet youth leader Elvira Astafyeva one expected to find a husky lass wearing combat boots who would tell about life in the communes.

Instead I found myself staring into the pretty green eyes of a shapely blonde wearing a snug fitting black sweater, gray skirt and black patent leather, spike heels—all products of the U.S.S.R.

Since my Russian is confined to yes (da) and no (nyet) which I pronounce as if I started to say something and forgot what it was, I was looking for someone among the 24 touring Soviet youth leaders who spoke English.

Elvira speaks English—the clear, cultured kind. In a soft, perfectly modulated voice she told me she was a 22-year-old philologist (science of linguistics) student at the University of Leningrad.

Enjoying Visit

She said she was thoroughly enjoying her first visit to America and was greatly "impressed with the hospitality" and...

A photographer interrupted. Would we mind facing the other way so the light would be better on Elvira's clear skin.

We turned to the north, the light was better. And Elvira continued.

Elvira said in the two weeks she has been in America she found furnishings here similar to those in Russian homes because the Soviets also have TV's, re-

frigerators and other appliances. And she also found the traffic situation similar in the large cities in both America and Russia.

Elvira was about to continue but she had to leave with four or five other members of her group to visit the Sidney Hillman Medical Center.

The Russian Type

I picked another subject. This time she was definitely the Russian type: Flat shoes, loose fitting sweater, full skirt, blonde hair pulled straight back, then braided in pig tails which were pinned up.

"Do you speak English?"

"Of course. Everybody who was born and raised in Philadelphia usually does."

This subject explained she was Margaret Rhoads, 22, accompanying the group as an interpreter-guide, and had toured Russia last summer on the same exchange program after graduating from Reed College, Portland, Ore.

Miss Rhoads said the American group was given a great deal of freedom while on its Russian tour although it didn't stay with any families. She said she did visit some flats in Moscow and found the furnishings much different—massive and dark.

She also said she found an abundance of TV's, few refrigerators and other appliances and the traffic problem practically nonexistent because of the relatively few number of automobiles.

All of which left me scratching my head.
