Colts Choice To Top Frisco, Gain Title Tie

The Baltimore Colts are 5½ point favorites to whip the Fortyniners at San Francisco Saturday and clinch at least a tie for the National Football League's Western Division title.

Baltimore and San Francisco are tied for the lead. Like the other 10 clubs, each has two more regular season games. Thus the winner of Saturday's nationally televised game will move a game ahead with one to go and will be certain of at least a tie for sectional honors.

The Cleveland Browns - Giants game at New York heads Sunday's five-game program. The

Giants lead the Browns and Philadelphia Eagles by two games and can clinch their second straight Eastern title with a victory or a tie. New York is a four-point choice to win.

The Eagles are 2½ point favorites to down the Redskins at Washington but Philadelphia's slender hope will depend on whether Cleveland can defeat New York.

The Chicago Bears, a game behind Baltimore and San Francisco, still are "alive" in the Western race. They are seven-point choices to defeat the visiting Pittsburgh Steelers, the team that has whipped the Giants, Browns and Eagles in the last three weeks.

In Sunday's other games, the Rams are favored over the Green Bay Packers by 5½ points at Los Angeles and the Lions are favored over the Chicago Cardinals by four at Detroit.

Husky Fans Grin Over New Look In Grid Pass Defense

SEATTLE (UPI) — Washington football fans used to shudder when an opposing player dropped back to pass.

Now their grin is as wide as the goal posts.

Sooner or later, they knew, some Husky is going to stick out a paw and haul in a misguided football.

It has happened 27 times this season. It means Rose Bowl fans will see some hard-nose football come New Year's Day since Wisconsin, Washington's opponent in the classic, is no slouch in the interception business, having nipped off 23 enemy aerials.

Two Pickoffs Per Game
In each of their 10 games this year or a match that resulted in a 9-1 record and the Rose Bowl bid, the huskies intercepted at least two passes.

Only one outfit, Oregon, was able to score against the Huskies.

via the aerial route. But Oregon air arm faltered when the chips were on the table.

Late in that game, with the Husky hanging onto a 13-12 edge Oregon quarterback Dave Grosz faded, searching for a receiver in the end zone.

Grosz cranked and threw and Bob Schloredt, Washington quarterback, came swooping across the yard to grab the ball and end the Oregon threat.

Perhaps the best demonstration of the tough Husky pass defense occurred Oct. 10 when the Stanford shotgun, Dick Norman, took the field against the Huskies.

Norman, who has etched national passing honors, tossed 21 times against the Huskies.

He completed only four passes for 63 yards and had four tosses intercepted. One interception led to a Washington touchdown as the Huskies turned in a 10-0 victory over the Indians.

In the newly organized Big Five conference, the Huskies led the loop in pass defense having yielded but 74.7 yards per game in the air.

Understandably, coach Jim Owens isn't giving away any family secrets on the system that plugged the cracks in Washington's once porous pass defense.

"You can say, though, that we've worked on pass defense quite a bit," he grins.
