Actor's Wife Blasts Movie Parties As Extremely Dull

HOLLYWOOD (UPI)—Pamela Mason, outspoken wife of actor James Mason, blasted movietown parties today as being exceedingly dull.

The England-born matron placed the blame on unimaginative hostesses who invite the same guests to soirees week after week.

"I don't go to parties anymore," Mrs. Mason said, "and I rarely give them. There are so few single people left in town all the parties are attended by married couples who don't want to be together in the first place. If that isn't enough, most parties are limited to persons in the same income bracket which is horribly dull."

"The men gather in one corner and play cards, when possible," she continued. "The wives all want to dance, no matter what their age, but nobody wants to dance with them."

Pamela went on to say the bored expressions on guests' faces indicate they attend parties as a social obligation, not because they're enjoying themselves.

"New faces are a rarity," she explained. "Occasionally when some performer becomes 'hot' he or she is invited to parties."

"I was dropped off several guest lists seven years ago when I criticized parties. There's no point in going to a party unless it's to flirt or play cards. But flirting is resented, and I don't play cards."

Conversation Becomes Dull

"No matter how interesting the other guests are, after years of sitting next to the same people at the dinner table the conversation becomes despairing. There's nothing new to talk about."

"My husband, James, is not anti-social, but by the time a couple dresses for a party, and counting the traveling time, an outing can become an eight-hour ordeal, which is too much time out of your life."

"Being a hostess is even worse. You're so busy looking after everyone you can't enjoy yourself."

Teen-Agers Talk Of TV Rigging, Delinquency, Segregation, Etc.

"I was pretty disgusted. You sorta looked up to those TV quiz guys when they won. Then it lowers your opinion of intellectuals. At least we thought they were intellectuals. Maybe they were just crumbly all the time."

Steve Cook speaking. Giving his opinion of quiz-show rigging. He's a teen-ager, 16. Tall, skinny, jeans-clad, blonde, a serious looking boy. The place is San Anselmo, Calif. Steve has just finished helping decorate a hall for a dance.

He's given to short, pithy answers. You ask him about adults and he says: "My pet peeve is that they don't give teen-agers a fair chance."

He's across the country, now, to Augusta, Maine. Here's David Elvin, 17, a high school senior, basketball player, good student, who wears a flat-top haircut and has a part-time job: "I think many parents are too lenient with their children—they let them have a lot of material things and don't teach them the responsibility of such things as operating cars."

"A Pretty Dirty Trick"

Down to the southland and Columbia, S.C., and a five-foot-two brunette named Carol Joy, 16. Quiz-show rigging? "It was a pretty dirty trick. It sure has ruined Van Doren. They (the riggers) ought to be straightened out by somebody."

And in New York, there's a red-haired 18-year-old named Elizabeth Forbes, working red roses into a corsage in the florist shop in a technical high school. She sounds off first when asked about the world's gravest problem:

"The racial discrimination, to me. Like down south; you know—it's not like up here. You're hired on your color, not your abilities. Up here, at least you get a fighting chance."

Arthur Hofmeister, 17, a neat, blond, shy-spoken New York kid who thinks hard before answering questions, summed up rock 'n' roll: "I don't like it. I think they have too many groozlers who make little sounds like ooh and ahh, just mumbo-jumbo, and put them on records."

No H-Bomb Worry

As for worry about the H-bomb and radiation threat, there was an almost universal response of "not really," "no," particularly, "not especially," combined with a fatalistic attitude. As Henry Hufnagel, 17, a senior at Evanston, Ill., Township High School said: "If it's going to be, it's going to be. I've other things to worry about."

Bob Kostecky, of La Jolla, Calif., a six-foot-one college freshman, said: "The possibility that it could actually happen has never entered my mind."

Molly Molloy, of Hillsborough, Calif., curly-haired, in a pink shirt and gray bermuda shorts after a tennis game, said she was "definitely" worried, but: "In a way the H-bomb might be good because it will make man think before acting."

Rock 'N' Roll—Horrible

About half the teen-agers loved rock 'n' roll, but the surprising other half—in an inkling of a trend—said it was horrible, stupidly worded, and on the way out. "Last year I thought it was the only thing," said Ron McWain, a bespectacled 16-year-old of Olympia, Wash., "but I don't any more... I've found other forms especially progressive jazz."

Adults were characterized as worrying too much, forgetting what it's like to be young, having a know-it-all attitude, setting bad examples, and, as a pretty brunette, 16, said: "My father is old-fashioned and won't let us date boys. Adults don't understand us."

The general reaction to a query about the world's gravest problem ran to Russ and Communism, the cold war, peace and warfare, and some said crime and juvenile delinquency. Molly Molloy, again, said: "Maybe we can start to consider morals when the problem of peace is ironed out."

But consider these other gravest problem answers:

"Too many people are getting away from God and Christianity."—Glen Apple, 19, of Tulsa, Okla.

"The uncooperative attitude that people have—nobody wants to work together."—James Kelley college freshman, San Gabriel, Cal.

"International politics and lack of diplomats and fewer politicians."—Robert Wiese, Hollywood, Calif.
