3,000 Lady Bugs Required For Film Background Scene

By VERNON SCOTT UPI Staff Writer HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Lady bug, lady bug, fly away home—or you'll wind up in cold storage on a television sound stage. That's what happened to some 3,000 luckless lady bug beetles this week, 2,969 of whom were standing for the star insect. The man in all these lady bugs' lives is Bernie Levine, property man for Columbia studios whose job it is to buy, borrow or steal the necessary props or "things" called for in movie and TV scripts. His latest script, "Lady Bug," for the Goodyear TV program required a single such bug for an important story point, and there-in lies a tale of frustration, exhaustion and final triumph. "Not Season For Bugs" "After I read the script I began asking around about lady bugs," Levine explained. "But it turns out they were out of season. I called old contacts who handle insects, snakes, lizards and other reptiles, and they told me lady bugs hibernate this time of year—just when I need them. I never knew before. "Bugs are hard enough to find. Hibernating bugs are impossible." Undaunted, Levine crept around on all fours for 2 1/2 days in private gardens, public parks and abandoned lots. No lady bugs. "All I got was sore knees, numb elbows and scratches from thorns," he complained. "I did turn up a lotta worms, slugs, ants, grasshoppers and one praying mantis. "Briefed Located "Then I heard about this guy in Yuba City, Calif., who breeds lady bugs. Can you beat that? "Well, I call and tell him I want one lady bug to crawl through the works of a big clock for a TV show. He thinks I'm nuts and says

he can't sell 'em to me in less than 3,000-bug lots. Big economy size is a gallon can of bugs for \$7. He breeds 'em because they eat destructive insects. "Anyway, a few days later this sack of lady bugs arrives, and I have to keep them in the refrigerator so they can keep sleeping it off. "Great Performance "Every 24 hours I had to sprinkle them with water. Then when I needed one bug for the show I held him or her, as the case may be—in front of a heater. The bug performed great, so we didn't need any of the stand-ins. "What happened to the 2,969 which didn't make the grade? "Somebody forgot to water them," he said without remorse, "and we had to throw them out. Maybe they warmed up and flew away to find some other place to hibernate—all except the one we used in the show. It died of exhaustion."
