Young Actor Changes Mind On Marriage, Grabs Beauty

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Case history of the downfall of a movie-town bachelor.

Subject: Harry Coe.

Age: 25.

Profession: actor, under contract to 20th Century-Fox.

June 20, 1959: "I like being a bachelor, dating different girls," he said in an interview. "Any man's a fool to think of getting married before the age of 30. I'll stay single for another five or ten years."

July 28, 1959: "I had to go to a luncheon at Fox for the Miss Universe contestants," he said. "I sat near the representatives from Denmark and Sweden. They were really beautiful."

July 29, 1959: Coe took both girls, Jorunn Kristiansen (Denmark) and Marie Louise Ekstrom (Sweden), to dinner and a night club.

Accepts Girls Invitation

July 30, 1959: Coe breakfasted with girls at their hotel. "They invited me as a joke, but I took them seriously. Both of 'em were pretty sore when I showed up at 8 o'clock in the morning."

Aug. 4, 1959: "By this time I'd decided that Jorunn was a very nice girl and that I should date her more often. She spoke more English than Marie Louise."

Oct. 20, 1959: "I heard they were going to make a screen test of UE at the studios, so I rigged it to appear opposite her. It wasn't a successful test, and both of us were glad."

Oct. 29, 1959: "Tried to get up courage to propose."

Oct. 30, 1959: "After two nights of fancy dinners and walks on the beach I finally blurted it out — 'will you marry me?' I asked. She said she would have to give it some thought."

Nov. 1, 1959: "Wrote to UE's parents in Norway, asking permission to marry their daughter. They weren't so sure about letting her marry an actor. So I promised them we would go to Norway and talk it over."

Cattle Import Health Checks

Stiffer requirements for cattle entering the state are now being enforced by the Oregon Department of Agriculture.

All out-of-state animals entering Oregon stockyards for other than slaughter purposes must be health-tested in the first yard, unless they have met full health requirements prior to entry.

Oregon will, however, accept cattle from clean herds in modified certified areas if they are accompanied by either an official health certificate or written evidence of such clean status by an authorized official of the state of origin.

Authorized officials include brand inspectors, livestock officers and veterinarians.

Oregon will not accept swine which have been vaccinated with virulent live hog cholera virus. Also, horses must have health certificates and all show animals must meet all health requirements.

The new regulations represent major changes in amendments to Oregon's livestock importation regulations. The changes were signed in November.

Predict New Records For U.S. Economy Throughout Next Year

NEW YORK (UPI) — The nation's economy and the stock market will set new records in 1960 if the experts' prophecies come true.

Daily now the predictions are coming in. None believe the steel strike broke the back of the recovery movement. The belief is the strike stretched out the rise which now seems to the prophets likely to run through 1960 at least.

Standard & Poor's sees a gross National Product in 1960 of \$300 billion or higher. That figure would compare with an estimated \$280 for 1959 and would represent a rise of 4.2 per cent, a rise greater than the normal growth rate.

Standard looks for its industrial index of 425 stocks to move between 57-58 and the upper 60s. Currently the index is around 62. The high this year—a record—was 65.32 and the low was 57.02. The upper 60s would mean a new top.

Market Boom Possible

This year's stock market movement has been restrained, Standard says. It currently is up 7.6 per cent. Last year the market rose 36.5 per cent in the industrial index. A broader movement is looked for in 1960.

Earnings on the index are estimated between \$4 and \$4.15 for 1960 and if they are realized it will be the most prosperous year on record. Dividends are expected to rise 10 per cent.

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This," says Standard, "is not an excessive valuation, and the price-earnings ratio could go higher on the wings of bullish business news in the forefront of the year. The prospect of a leveling of earnings after the initial upsurge, however, may act to restrain enthusiasm."

Other reasons for restraint are given as the continuing tight money policy and the increased investment appeal of bonds. The spread of yields between stocks and bonds has widened substantially.

But Standard doesn't rule out a somewhat higher level of stock prices for two reasons: 1. A prospective average increase of 12½ per cent in dividend payments next year, which would lift stock yields appreciably in terms of current prices, and 2. The promise of higher earnings and dividends eventually, based on strong growth trends inherent in the economy.

Also it is noted that institutions have a considerable reserve of stock purchasing power which could be shifted from short-term debt holdings to stocks on a selective basis when "the time seems right."

On the basis of a \$500 billion GNP, Standard plots personal income at \$395 billion up 4.2 per cent from 1959 and disposable income at \$347 billion, a gain of 4 per cent. Personal saving is expected to rise 2.1 per cent to \$24 billion.

Personal consumption expenditures are expected to reach \$323 billion, up 4.1 per cent. Of these \$45.5 billion are expected to be spent on durable goods, a rise of 5.8 per cent; \$151.5 billion on non-durable goods, a rise of 2.9 per cent, and \$126 billion on services, a rise of 5 per cent.

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
