Continued from Page 6A He listed a strong work ethic and selflessness among some of the traits he looks for. Mills, a 2010 graduate of

Southern Mississippi, played professionally for a year in 2014, representing FC Olimpia in Moquegua, Peru.

He takes over as the third head coach at EOU in as many seasons. Ken Huber, who stepped into the position in 2017, left in late May to become the head coach at his alma mater, Olivet Nazarene University.

Mills said it'll be a challenge leading the program with such a short turnaround before the season starts. The team takes the field for practice Aug. 6 and plays its first game Aug. 24 against Whitworth.

But he's excited for the challenge. Part of that learning curve will involve letting the team just play to see what the skill set is.

"I don't know any of these players really. I cannot wait to watch them (play)," Mills said.

The Mountaineers posted a record of 8-8-1 last season and went 5-7-1 in the Cascade Collegiate Conference. In three years of existence, the program has a mark of 26-23-2.
