Tigers sweep their way to title at Hanna Cashell tourney

After coming up short the previous two years, the La Grande Tigers volleyball team won the Hanna Cashell Memorial Tournament.

And they did so in dominant fashion.

La Grande swept its way through pool play, then through bracket play, culminating in a 25-16, 25-15 win over Baker in the title game of the tournament Saturday at La Grande High School.

"It was great. It's always one of those bittersweet days," Head Coach Melinda Becker-Bisenius said. "We're playing a lot of volleyball, but we're honoring Hanna's memory. We want to win it, and have come up short the last two years. To win it this time and beat Baker, that was good."

The Tigers were only challenged in one set during pool play. La Grande topped Imbler (25-16, 25-10), Nampa Christian (25-13, 25-23) and Ontario (25-13, 25-7) to win its pool. The Tigers came back from an 8-0 deficit in the second set against Nampa Christian.

In bracket play, La Grande handled McLoughlin in the quarterfinals (25-11, 25-12) and beat Vale, last year's tournament champion, 25-22, 25-19, in the semifinals.

"I was really proud of how well my team stepped up this weekend," Becker-Bisenius said. "We tried a bunch of different lineups (and) they adjusted. We were trying to find a lineup that worked. We had to mix it up. I was proud of how well we played as a group."

The bevy of players stepping up was evident in the stat sheet. Jayce Seavert led the Tigers with 18 kills, 45 digs and four aces. Riana Scott had 15 kills and 29 digs, and both Claire Hardy and Allie Brock added eight kills. Felicity Houston had 36 digs and 12 aces. Jacie Howton doled out 40 assists and Kenzie Williams had 29 assists to go with five aces.

A young Union team that possesses no seniors split six sets in pool play, falling to Vale (25-11, 25-23), splitting with Baker (25-21, 17-25) and sweeping McLoughlin (25-18, 25-21).

Once they reached bracket play, the Bobcats topped Nampa Christian in the quarterfinals, 25-22, 25-21, but lost to Baker in the semifinals, 25-21, 25-19.

"They realized not only could they hang with some

of those teams, (but) they could beat them," Head Coach Lasa Baxter said. "That was a big confidence booster."

Freshman Callie Glenn had a strong day with 55 assists in the tournament. She also served up 10 aces. Fellow freshman Kalin Nowak added 23 kills.

"Those freshmen who are starting for me are certainly exceptional freshmen," Baxter said.

Autumn Daggett also had 23 kills, and Brianna Kohr had 28 digs and seven aces.

"I've been coaching college football for 22 years (and) that might be one of the best catches I've ever seen, without a doubt,"

Camp said.

Added Quinn: "He's a tremendous athlete and wide receiver, but for him to pull that off was amazing."

Quinn polished off EOU's scoring with a three-yard run early in the fourth quarter for a 10-point lead.

The defense held up from there. The Mountaineers' defensive line was consistently in the face of C of I quarterback Darius-James Peterson, limiting him to 136 yards passing, eight yards rushing, sacking him three times and forcing two fourth-quarter interceptions — both of which were

pulled in by Zack Jacobs.

"You have to give credit to the (defensive) line," Jacobs said of the second pick.

"They put pressure on that quarterback. He absolutely

panicked and threw it up. I read the ball (and) got it. Without them, I don't make that pick."

Brenden Kelly led the Mountaineers' receiving corps with 129 yards on 10 catches. Hancock and Phoenix Milhollen added 62 and

57 yards, respectively.

The Mountaineers said they have plenty to clean up headed into next week's showdown against No. 4
Southern Oregon. EOU committed 10 penalties, had several dropped passes on offense and a few blown coverages on defense.

"We weren't perfect by any means. Not at all," Quinn said. "We've got a lot of stuff we have to work on this next week going into Southern. Southern's going to be a great team. All we wanted to do was get the win and that's what we did. Very proud of everyone. It was a tremendous team

win."
