"Giving honor to whom honor is due" is a principle of life that is communicated in many places and many different ways in God's word. One such place is in Romans 13:7, in a context that is addressing our response to authorities in our lives, specifically authorities in civil/government service such as law enforcement or the military.

In God's economy of greatness and honor, the focus is stated to be on those who serve not those who seek to be served or get what they can for themselves according to Mark 9:35. True service often involves real sacrifice. You have not sacrificed until you have really suffered. People who die or who are permanently injured on the battlefields for freedom have truly paid a high price and are worthy of honor. People who have laid their lives on the line and even lost their lives in service are worthy of our honor, recognition and respect. People who bravely put themselves in harm's way on a regular basis because of their willingness to make the world and their community a better place deserve to be our heroes. There are those who suffer the psychological scars and challenges of traumatic events due to their service and have truly sacrificed their peace and tranquility in life so they could help others. A high price has been paid by many for our comfort and freedoms.

According to the Officer Down Memorial website, this year alone 98 law enforcement officers

have been killed in our country in the line of duty to their communities. According to the Fire Rescue 1 website, this year 62 firefighters have given the ultimate sacrifice in the line of their duty of service across our nation. According to the Honor the Fallen page of the Military Times website, you will find that 23 military personnel have given their lives during active duty deployment in Operation Enduring Freedom, Operation Iraqi Freedom and Operation New Dawn so far this year. However, since those military campaigns have begun, more than 15,000 lives have been lost. The public service of these brave men and women have truly "cost them everything," and they are worthy of respect and honor for their service and sacrifice.

Sept. 11 is known as Patriot Day as we remember the attacks on our nation 17 years ago and all those who were lost that day and in the battles that have resulted from that attack. At Summerville Baptist Church, we will recognize this Sunday, Sept. 9, as Patriot Sunday. We will remember the sacrifices of that day not only in civilian casualties but also all the first responders who lost their lives attempting to rescue others and the many who have died since then as a result of injuries and chemical

lung damage from the fallen World Trade Center Towers. It is important for us to respect the true sacrifices of those who serve, to honor their service they gave and to remember their loved ones who are still without their presence.

I, personally, am thankful for those who are willing to suit up in uniforms, don badges and serve our communities and our nation. I would like to encourage all of my fellow citizens to show their respect to those who do and have valiantly served for our safety, protection and wellbeing as Americans. Take time to express your appreciation when you see someone in a uniform of service. If you are a person who prays, pray when you hear a siren sounding from an emergency vehicle going to meet a need in our community. Pray also for the families and department personnel of those who died in the line of duty. Their loss is still being felt every day by the empty place left in the lives of their loved ones.

I realize there are bad apples in every profession even in these departments of public service. But a few bad apples doesn't make every public servant worthy of disrespect. How many of us have a bad apple or two in our family line? Do you want to be judged by others for the bad apple in your family? Let's give honor to all those who serve honorably in the honorable professions of public service.
