Montana Tech is a team that is more run oriented, passing for an average of 190 yards per game and rushing for 200. EOU Head Coach Tim Camp said the focus will be on containing Fike and the ground game.

Stopping the run game will go largely back to one of the fundamentals of the sport, tackling, which Camp said EOU did much better in against Southern Oregon, SOU had 236 rushing yards in the early September contest. Last week, the Raiders had just 86.

"That's all we talked about. If they're going to try and run, we're going to stop them. We loaded the box up a little bit (and) we tackled better," Camp said.

The coach said the Mountaineers also need to be ready for Tech to put the ball in the air.

"We want to stop their run obviously, but they're college football players, (and) they're capable of throwing, too," he said. "In their playbook they also have a passing game."

The offense has its first turnover-free game of the season against SOU, but Camp noted there were opportunities for EOU to do better last week.

"We had 400 yards of offense on a really good defense, but there are about 125 (yards) left out there," Camp said, noting EOU dropped several passes and allowed four sacks.

The sacks, though have been a rarity, as EOU's offensive line has kept quarterback Kai Quinn clean and helped open up the running game. SOU's four-sack day last week came on the heels of two straight games where the Mountaineers didn't allow a sack. In fact, Southern has recorded 10 sacks total in its two games against EOU. The Mountaineers' four other opponents have just

That has helped Quinn in posting the conference's top offensive numbers in passing yards (306 per game), while running back Victor Dias is up to 83 yards per game rushing, second in the con-
