# **Red Cross seeks** blood drive hosts

Every two seconds someone in the U.S. needs blood. To help meet the constant demand for lifesaving blood donations and prevent blood shortages this winter, the American Red Cross is urging individuals and organizations to be winter heroes by hosting a blood drive.

During the winter, there is often a decrease in the number of blood drives, which can contribute to blood shortages. The Red Cross needs about 6,500 additional groups across the country to host blood drives in December, Januarv and February to ensure blood will be there for patients who rely on blood products.

A Red Cross representative works with the host, providing planning assistance, tools to recruit blood donors, equipment and supplies and the trained staff needed to screen donors and collect donations. Blood drive hosts provide a large, open location, identify volunteers to support donor recruitment, and recruit and schedule blood donors. Continued from Page 2A land, traveled north and was accompanied by hail the size of golf balls.

The weather event was one of more than 60 significant tornadoes reported in Oregon since 1887, according to Taylor and Hatton.

### Q: Who founded the old Wallowa County community of Promise?

A: John C. Phillips and W. Mann, both homesteaders, settled in Promise around 1891, according to the book "Oregon Geographic Names" by Lewis McAr-

thur. The area, 25 miles north of Wallowa, was first known as Promised Land and Land of Promise, for that is how Mann referred to it. Mann did so apparently because it fit in with the upbeat names of the nearby communities of Paradise and Garden of Eden, according to a piece by Mim Lagoe in the book "About Wallowa County: Places, People, Names."

The U.S. Postal Service gave the community the name of Promise when a post office was established there in 1896. The post office closed in 1944.

Promise was an agricultural community known for its apple orchards, which produced many varieties of apples including Astricans, Permians, Red Junes, Wealthys, Wolf River and Rambos, according to an article by Marilyn Hulse in "About Wallowa County." The produce was taken by wagon to rail lines in Elgin and La Grande from where they were transported to Portland. Some of the produce was also taken to a large logging camp at Maxville in Wallowa County.
