Tigers rally, roar to state

The disappointment that ended the season for the La Grande Tigers volleyball team the last four years — a postseason loss at home — seemed likely again Saturday in the first round of the Class 4A state playoffs.

The Marshfield Pirates appeared on their way to victory after taking a two-set lead. Their attack was powerful and on-point so much so that at times a kill or ace was hit so hard it knocked back a Tiger defender who tried to make a play on it.

Instead, the Tigers found the grit to fight back and, fueled by a crowd that got progressively


louder down the stretch, pulled off a stunning comeback to reach the state quarterfinals, topping Marshfield in five sets, 21-25, 19-25, 25-20, 25-22, 15-8.

"Our bench stepped it up, the kids out on the floor stepped it up, and it was amazing to see," Head Coach Melinda Becker-Bisenius said. "I can't tell you how proud I am of the team."

After winning set three, the Tigers scored the final four points of the fourth set on a Jayce Seavert kill and three Marshfield errors to send the match to the deciding fifth set.

La Grande quickly took control in the final set with a 7-1 run

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La Grande's Felicity Houston had 29 digs for the Tigers, which as a team collected 121 digs in the match.

Late score, defense lifts Imbler to playoffs

Every fan in Community Stadium likely expected Imbler running back Ryan Patterson to get the handoff on the potential game-winning touchdown.

His own teammates expected it. The play was even called for him.

But a read by quarterback Chance Goodman — on a play he said he messed up, no less — resulted in the winning score and sent the Panthers back to the state

Goodman scored on a four-yard keeper with 44 seconds remaining to lift the Imbler football team to a thrilling 30-26 victory over the Crane Mustangs in the Special District 3 playoffs Friday at Community Stadium.

"It's been a couple years since we've gone (to the playoffs)," Goodman said. "I haven't been able to go, and we just missed out a couple times, so to be able to go back is awesome. I'm so proud of our guys."

Goodman's winning score capped a comeback from a 12-point fourth-quarter deficit for Imbler, which had spotted Crane a 26-14 lead after Chase Joyce recovered a fumble — his third recovery of the game — and returned it 93 yards for a touchdown on the first play of the final period.

Imbler didn't blink. Instead, the Panthers followed with an 82-yard drive, which Goodman finished with a score from a yard out, to get within 26-22, then forced Crane to punt and got the ball back with 5:49 to play.

Patterson, who rushed for 274 yards in the win, did yeoman's work on the winning 55-yard drive, carrying the ball on eight straight plays at one point, including down to the four-yard line with less than a minute left.

The senior was set to get the ball a ninth straight time, but said Goodman made the correct read on keeping the ball. While Patterson stuffed behind the line, Goodman skated untouched to the left for the
