"He just keeps on getting better and better," Cristobal said about Verdell

The loss ended the season for the Beavers (2-10, 1-8) in coach Jonathan Smith's first year as coach.

"The game itself, you can look at it from a lot of different reasons for it not going our way — in the run game, both sides of the ball, rough. Opportunity to finish some drives, we didn't do it. Momentum, never really came on our side," Smith said.

"So that is not the standard. We are going to continue to work and look forward to building on this thing."

It may have been the final Civil War for Herbert, who could forgo his senior year to declare for the NFL draft. He is widely considered one of the top prospects at the position, but could opt to stay at Oregon for the chance to play with his younger brother Patrick, a four-star tight end who has committed to the

Herbert was replaced by backup Braxton Burmeister for the second half. Ducks coach Mario Cristobal

said afterward he would not have an update on Herbert's condition until the junior QB got back to Eugene for additional tests

"It didn't seem like it was too big of a shot, but enough where we had to keep him out," Cristobal said.

Ducks running back Tony Brooks-James was also injured on the opening kickoff of the second half and returned to the sidelines on crutches with what looked to be a left knee injury.

It also might have been the final game for Beavers quarterback Jake Luton, who threw for 282 yards and two scores. Luton has been beset by injuries during his Oregon State career including a thoracic spine fracture last season and a high ankle sprain this season. There's a possibility that Oregon State could petition for a sixth year of eligibility for Luton because of medical hardship.

Oregon State true freshman running back Jermar Jefferson ran for 64 yards in the loss. Jefferson ranked seventh nationally with 119.6 yards rushing per game going into the Civil War. Isaiah Hodgins had eight catches for 133 yards for

the Beavers.

The Beavers gave up 510 total offensive yards to the Ducks, including 392 yards rushing.

"Four-hundred yards rushing is something you don't want, obviously. Definitely we didn't execute as well, as we should have, as well as we could have, as well as we're able to," Oregon State linebacker Andrzej Hughes-Murray said.

The Ducks went up 21-0 in the first quarter on a trio of touchdowns from Verdell, the first on a 21-yard pass from Herbert and then two 1-yard runs.

"They have a lot of JC transfers and international kids," the coach said. "They have some experience. They'll be ready to play no matter what.

The Mountaineers' middle match in pool play, on Wednesday, is against an Oklahoma City Stars team that they faced at nationals two years ago. EOU swept Oklahoma City in that match on the way to a berth in the quarterfinals.

"Usually they're a team

that has a lot of transfers." McLean-Morehead said, noting its the team she knows the least about. "Again, that game is not going to be easy, but at least we'll have some time to scout them."

McLean-Morehead added the team will study more film on its opponents before action kicks off Tuesday. She said the team will have to play its game if it wants to be one of the two teams to advance out of the pool.

"We have to serve and pass well. We have to do the things we do well to compete," she said. "Hopefully (having) four months of a tough conference season and conference tournament (will help). I think our kids are on the same page and willing to put forth the effort."

The coach believes her back line defense, which has been a strength all season, will need to be stout again for the team to move on. EOU will rely heavily on players such as Kiley McMurtrey (468 digs), Megan Bunn (380), Aspen Christiansen (279), Sarah Carpenter (222) and Pilon (210).

"The defense is a huge piece of it for us," McLean-Morehead said.

The Mountaineers' offense will also need to show the balance that it has had in

the latter half of the season. Bunn (369 kills) and Hailee Ackerman (348) both have had seasons that rank in the top 10 in program history in attacking, but players such as Taylor Tibbetts (179 kills), Cambree Scott (112) and Allyson Crisp (75) have made their presence felt of late, and will need to again.

"With the offense being more balanced, it spreads the (other team's) blockers and gives us more opportunities to have holes to swing through," Bunn said. "It shows that we have multiple strong hitters, and it's hard to key in on just one. Hopefully it scatters the other

team's defense and we're able to put balls away from every position."

Nina Bailey and Jet Taylor, newcomers whom McLean-Morehead has used off the bench as energy boosters, could be called upon earlier in a match as well.

"Jet and Nina both have something that is very

intangible on the court. You can feel it," the coach said. "If we need it, I definitely will not hesitate to go to them sooner."

If EOU (23-7 overall) does advance out of pool play, it would play a round-of-16 match on Friday. The championship match is Saturday

Even though William Carey enters with a No. 2 ranking, has previous experience at this level and has played eight ranked teams this season, Plocher said he's not worried.

The fact that they are "battle-tested" does "give them a little edge," he said of the Crusaders, which have gone 5-3 against ranked teams this season, "but when you get to the top 16, every team is a good team. You never know what's going to happen."

Plocher said it would give the Mountaineers a huge boost if they're able to score early on like they did in their first-round game against Grace College a week ago.

Taylor Boyer scored in the fourth minute with her teamleading 16th goal — one shy of tying the single-season program record — and EOU took a 2-0 first-half lead on the way to a 2-1 win.

"Any time you're able to put one away early, it makes things a little more relaxed and (gives us) more confidence in what we're capable of doing," he said. "When that happened, we (said), 'we're here, we're in this."

But the coach believes even staying close to the Crusaders into the second half will give his team a shot.

The match against William Carey is set for 9 a.m. Tuesday. A win would move Eastern into a quarterfinal contest Wednesday afternoon against either Lindsey Wilson or Georgia Gwinnett. The final is on Saturday.



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
