EOU drops scrappy Lions

Eastern Oregon Head Coach Anji Weissenfluh gave the Multnomah women's basketball team credit for hanging tough.

In the end, though, the Mountaineers' pace of play, three big runs and rebounding were the difference as No. 9 EOU pulled away from the Lions, 91-62, Tuesday night in the quarterfinals of the Cascade Collegiate Conference Tournament in La Grande.

"They came ready to play," Weissenfluh said of the Lions. "They played strong, they played together. Sequoia (Wheeler) had a great game ... It wasn't necessarily what we were doing, it was a lot of what Multnomah was doing (that kept the game closer).

Wheeler led all scorers with 25 points — 19 of which came in the first half - to help the Lions hang around much longer than they did in an 84-38 loss to EOU just two weeks ago. Multnomah was within 20-19 after one, and still close midway through the second, trailing just 34-29 after a Milan Woods jumper.

But Maya Ah You-Dias, who led EOU with 23 points and 14 rebounds, kicked off the first of two game-changing runs with back-to-back 3-pointers — one after grabbing an offensive rebound and the second in transition — to push the margin to 11. Maren Herrud hit a jumper to make it a 15-point margin and later canned a 3-pointer

before two Beverly Slater free throws capped the 17-2 spurt for a 20-point edge.

"We settled down (and) we kept putting the gas pedal on in transition," Weissenfluh said. "A lot of our points came out of transition, and we knew if we were going to separate ourselves we had to score in transition."

Two more runs — a 9-0 run late in the third and a 15-0 run in the fourth — put the

game well in hand for EOU. Ah You-Dias hit a layup to cap the first run, which sent Eastern into the fourth leading 70-46, and 3-pointers by Herrud, Jane Nelson and Whitney Meier gave Eastern an 88-52 lead, its largest of the night.

"We wanted to push the ball as fast as we could," Ah You-Dias said.

Ah You-Dias helped spark the key first half run, and had

17 points by the break, but by no means was alone in getting EOU's offense going. Herrud had 14 points, Emma Logan added 11 - all in the first half — and both Kylie Smith and Julia Hanni had

Logan, who typically impacts the game on the defensive side, turned in her top scoring effort of the season.

Eastern finishes 1-5 on opening road trip

The Eastern Oregon women's softball team went 1-3 in the final two days of its season-opening roadtrip to Redding, California, falling to William Jessup, 9-6, and Simpson, 11-3, on Monday before splitting Simpson in a doubleheader Tuesday, winning 8-6 and losing 6-4.

Against William Jessup, Jordan Henley homered to trigger a three-run fourth inning for a 3-1 lead, and a bases-loaded walk and an RBI groundout by Sarah Bonner made it 5-4 in the fifth.

The game went to extra innings, and Haley Ebner hit an RBI single in the top of the eighth for a 6-5 lead, but WJ's Jena Ovens hit a walkoff grand slam to give the Spartans the win.

Ebner finished with two hits for EOU, and Rayne Spencer drove in a pair of runs. Ashton Kazmierski gave up four runs on five hits in 4-2/3 innings to take the

In Monday's second game against Simpson, the Moun-

taineers scored three firstinning runs on a Madison Barr RBI double and RBI singles by Shevan DeFreitas and Hannah Rothwell, but Simpson scored the next 11 runs, taking the lead for good with three runs in the second inning for a 6-3 lead.

Jessica Lambert allowed eight runs on seven hits in three-plus innings in the loss.

On Tuesday, the Mountaineers picked up their first win of 2019, pulling ahead for good in the fifth inning on the way to the 8-6 victory.

Spencer, DeFreitas and Ashley Kelly all homered in the win for EOU, with Kelly's two-run blast in the fifth putting Eastern ahead for good, 7-5. Spencer added her home run in the sixth for the final margin. Amanda Smith tossed a complete game for the win, allowing six runs on 10 hits and striking out five batters. Henley and Barr both had two hits.

In the finale the Mountaineers jumped ahead 3-0 in the third on a three-run home run by DeFreitas, but couldn't hold the lead as the Red Hawks scored four runs in the bottom of the fifth to take the lead for good, with Gentry Hoffman's three-run home run the tiebreaking hit. Ebner added a sacrifice fly in the seventh for the final mar-

DeFreitas and Hannah Rothwell both had two hits. Kazmierski took the loss, allowing five runs on five hits in 4-1/3 innings.
