Steven Beckman has put himself among the best to ever don a wrestling singlet in the state of Oregon.

The senior on the Joseph/Wallowa Eagles wrestling team clinched his third consecutive Class 2A/1A state title Friday and Saturday in Portland, finishing off the championship with a dominant 12-0 major decision over Reedsport's

Christian Solomon in the finale at 113 pounds.

And he did so despite suffering an injury early in the season that left the hopes of the three-peat in peril.

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Eastern holds on in 2OT thriller



Badgers, Eagles, Outlaws all bound for quarterfinals

Defense has been the calling card for the Powder Valley Badgers girls basketball team this season.

It was again Saturday night, and it propelled the Badgers back to the state quarterfinals.

Megan Bingham scored a game-high 17 points and Powder Valley forced 27 turnovers and never trailed in a 49-28 home win over the Southwest Christian Wildcats in the second

round of the 1A state play-"As a team we have good lockdown defense, so we know that a lot of teams can't really play with us if

we play really tight and ag-

gressive defense," Bingham

The defense has been stout of late, holding eight opponents to 30 points or less during Powder Valley's current 10-game winning streak.

"We talked about defense in the locker room before, that (if) we play great defense, everything else will take care of itself, and it does," Head Coach Allen Bingham said.

The defense, highlighted by its full-court press, harassed the Wildcats early and often. Nineteen of Southwest Christian's turnovers came in the first half, many against the press. It helped the

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
