What did it look like? Were you looking at that person? Did you have some kind of physical touch that fueled the connection? Some great ways to create connecting moments with your child is through fun games or activities that can take less than five minutes out of your day. Make yourself and your loved ones a commitment: take time out of each and every day to truly connect. Play pat-acake or peek-a-boo with your young child, check in with your older children by playing a game make cards with questions on them to find out how their day went or what is happening in their lives, be present for your significant other as they discuss their struggles or successes.
