

Continued from Page 1A Marching Band, and Stampeders as well as articles of clothing from the World War I and World War II eras, according to Grandeen.

"The Stampeders had riding teams back then, and they all wore the green and white chaps, but they don't do that anymore," he said, adding while the displays are all "preliminary" now, they will be completed before the June 15 opening date.

Grandeen also mentioned

there are numerous photographs — some dating back to the late 1800s - featuring aspects of Elgin businesses, logging and agriculture that need to be identified.

"We have a lot of photographs from the old museum, and we don't have any master sheet, so we're going to ask for help," he said. "This weekend there will be a lot of people from out of town, but we'll take whatever (information) we can get."

The museum and historical society vice president noted the location of Elgin's new museum is especially helpful, as it sits between the Elgin Opera House and the train depot. This gives the history hub street visibility, offers excellent parking and provides room to possibly expand.

"We were just ecstatic when (Elgin Mayor) Allan Duffy said, 'Why don't you guys take over the old city hall?" he said. "It couldn't be in a better place.'

2 killed in Salem shooting

SALEM — Authorities said two men were fatally shot in Salem Monday night and two people have been arrested.

The Statesman Journal reports Marion County Sheriff's deputies responded to a shooting report about 10:15 p.m. Monday. The sheriff's office said when deputies arrived, 35-year-old Bradley Kelley was found dead.

Two others found with injures were taken to a hospital. The sheriff's office said 35-year-old Michael Buntjer died at the hospital and 26-year-old Coral Olfert suffered injuries that were not life threatening.

He said there is one thing about Elgin he's not a fan of: "I don't like the winters."

He noted in 1964, heavy winter snow followed by a strong melt-off in the spring led to serious flooding.

"We had 4 feet of water in our basement," Spikes recalled.

The board candidate said he has long been impressed with the quality of the teachers and staff in the Elgin School District.

"We have very good people," Spikes said.

Spikes is a big supporter of Elgin School District offerings, including its career and technical education programs. These programs teach welding, furniture making, metal fabrication and home building. He wants the school district to continue keeping its CTE programs as strong as possible.

"Teaching trade skills is great for kids. College is not for everyone," he said.

People need to step up," he said.


Ballots for the election have been mailed out and must be returned to the Union County Clerk's office by 8 p.m. May 21. ■
