 last two seasons, injuries have cost him a number of games. He suffered a thoracic spine fracture in the fourth game in 2017 and missed the rest of the season.
 Then he dealt with a concussion, suffered in the 2018 opener, and a high ankle sprain later in the season.
 But he says he is feeling healthy and ready to go.
 "I've been injured. I've been on the bad end of some things and it's been tough but I think there's some things I can do, healthwise, to make sure that doesn't happen again, and I've been

trying to do that," he said. "I've been moving better, and being able to escape some situations will definitely help out."
 Both players battled it out in the spring, along with junior Jack Colletto. Colletto, who made a start against Colorado last season, will still get some reps at quarterback but Smith said Wednesday he is also spending time at linebacker.
 Offensive coordinator Brian Lindgren was asked Wednesday about the possibility of using a two-quarterback system.
 "I feel really comfortable with both guys but I don't see that happening," he said.

 passes, ranking him fifth among active quarterbacks heading into the 2019 season.
 Asked what he thought was an area for improvement, Herbert said "consistency."
 "I think at times we played pretty good football last year. The first half of the year we were moving the football really well, then kind of fell off in the later part of the year," he said. "I'd say putting together a full season would be huge."
 Herbert will be joined this year by his younger brother Patrick, a tight end who was

among nearly a dozen early enrollees for the Ducks who took part in spring practice.
 The Herberts aren't the only talented brothers on the team. Senior linebacker Troy Dye, who like Herbert decided to remain at Oregon for his senior year, is joined by younger brother Travis, a running back.
 The younger Dye had 739 rushing yards and four touchdowns as a freshman last season, including three 100-yard games in conference play. He partnered with CJ Verdell (1,018 yards, 10 touchdowns) for a formidable Oregon backfield that returns this season.

 the fifth and sixth inning on an A.J. Arante sacrifice fly and an RBI groundout by Griffith for a 6-0 lead.
 La Grande, which collected a hit in the third inning to end a nine-inning hitless streak, finally got on the board in the seventh when Jarrett Armstrong scored on a balk. Armstrong had walked to begin the frame, one of two times he earned a free pass in the contest.
 La Grande starting pitcher Sam Tsiatsios shook off the tough first inning — all the runs scored before an out was recorded — to toss five

innings. He allowed five runs — three earned — on six hits, walked three batters and struck out nine. He allowed just one hit following the first inning.
 Armstrong tossed the final two innings, allowing one run on two hits and striking out two batters.
 Livermore starter Tristan Webb held La Grande in check, giving up just three singles in seven innings. He walked four batters and struck out one.
 Golden Hill, Southern California, which had defeated La Grande a day earlier in the semifinals, topped Livermore 13-3 Saturday in the championship.
