Safe Communities Coalition and partners build online safety awareness

Sometimes we have big ideas we know have the potential to make a differ-

ence. Getting ideas on paper to come to life is often the challenge that sets us back or even puts those ideas

back on the shelf. But that is not the case for a small group of compassionate and caring community members who want to help our community be healthier and safer.

In 2014, as the Union County District Attorney I was seeing an increase of reports from both school staff and law enforcement of incidents of teenagers making horrible choices in their cellphone use. Whether it be with apps or text messaging and social media, the law was not catching up to the technology and kids were clearly not thinking about the consequences. I saw a gap where no one was talking to kids about being safe online and the consequences of the choices they make from behind a phone or computer screen.

Enter the Union County Safe Communities Coalition and the Center for Human Development. Together with the Union County District Attorney's Office, we formed a collaborative committee to put on an annual day-long conference for all Union County seventh-graders. The committee works yearround to select speakers and content that will effectively help kids be healthy both in their interpersonal relationships and online. This is the first event of its kind, bringing middle schoolers from the entire county together to learn about a very real issue in their lives.

We knew we were on the right track with our first keynote speaker. We brought in a young woman whose life had been ruined after texting a topless picture to her boyfriend. She had been shocked when he shared it all over the place, and her life subsequently spiraled out of control. She told the group of seventhgraders that the popular app Snapchat saves all images. There was an audible gasp from nearly every student in the room, who believed the photos had been erased. We knew we were making a difference.

We have also provided an evening session for parents to learn more about technology and parenting skills related to social media and apps.


This year, the committee will be bringing Matt Bellace for the evening parent presentation. He is a comedian and psychologist who will be speaking

on the best ways to talk to teens about difficult topics. The presentation will be on Sept. 12 in the La Grande Middle School Commons. Doors open at 5:30 p.m., and the presentation begins at 6 p.m. Child care and refreshments will be provided for those who pre-register, and it will be livestreamed to the surrounding communities at Stella Mayfield Elementary in Elgin, North Powder High School and Cove High School.


