programs coordinator for Wallowology, said there will be opportunities to make bird feeders out of pinecones slathered with seed butter and seeds, as well as snowflake Christmas ornaments and ice lanterns.

There will also be a station to learn the science of how the Earth goes around the sun and why the solstice happens.

"We are using art to teach sci-

ence." Austin said. "We want to offer another way for people to celebrate the winter season and focus on the science of winter and the solstice."

Masks are required and activities will be spaced out in the center to allow for social distancina.

To celebrate the solstice and winter ecology outdoors, the public is invited to meet at the main lwetemlaykin parking lot on the Wallowa Lake Highway at 5 p.m. on Dec. 21 for a short hike.

To illuminate the walk on the darkest night of the year, bring a lantern or come to Wallowology beforehand to make your own ice lantern. The guided walk will be led by a Wallowology naturalist.

"We're pretty excited about this new event together and hope it will be a success and lead to it happening again in years to come," Miller said.
