"I'm grateful for this opportunity to connect with people through Fireside. I'm writing new work to read because I want to honor and enjoy our time together," she said.

She kept writing during the pandemic, although extra work at her job and more family demands have meant she has less time. This year she began

and anthologies. Every December she thinks of "Imogene's Answer," the story of her family being homeless in the middle of winter and being helped by a complete stranger. KWVR radio aired a reading of the story for a Christmas Day broadcast and now she shares the recording

with family and friends each year.

Miller is a herder and often feels kinship with other herders, both in this country and from other parts of the world.

"Even though I'm getting older, I still appreciate opportunities to create ritual and help with hard work, especially babies and birth, death and love, ranching and wild lonely places," she said.
