2022 Winter Olympics

After its tour-de-force Opening Ceremony for the 2008 Summer Olympics, Beijing will have the eyes of the world on it once again as it officially pulls the curtain up on the 2022 Winter Games. More than 2,800 athletes from 87 countries will parade into Beijing National Ceremony — aka “the Bird’s Nest” — to mark the official beginning of these games, which run through Feb. 20 on NBC, CNBC, USA Network, NBColympics.com, Peacock and the NBC Sports app.

Movie: To Sir, With Love

The teacher-as-hero drama has become a genre unto itself. But this 1967 classic stands out from the pack thanks to Sidney Poitier, who died last month at age 94 at the end of a distinguished career. His character, an out-of-work engineer who has taken a teaching gig to pay the bills, works wonders with a class full of rude, crude young Brits teetering on the brink of juvenile delinquency. Movie: The Wrong High School Sweetheart

Nostalgia can throw a rosy glow over imperfections of the past, so when Danielle (Mea Wilkerson) unexpectedly has a reunion with her old flame from high school, Danny (Alex Trumble), the encounter feels poignant and sweet — at first. It’s not long, however, before Danielle discovers Danny obsessively wants to live in those teenage glory days, and he’ll resort to just about anything to keep their past romance alive in this new thriller.
