Pacific Northwest Market Summary: Cash wheat bids for July delivery ended the reporting week on Thursday, July 19, mixed compared to week ago noon bids for July delivery.

September wheat futures ended the reporting week on Thursday, July 19, higher as follows compared to week ago closes: Chicago wheat futures were 32.25 cents higher at 5.3650, Kansas City wheat futures were 37.50 cents higher at 5.34 and Minneapolis wheat futures trended 51 cents higher at 5.8775. Chicago September corn futures trended 10.25 cents higher at 3.6150 and August soybean futures closed 15.25 cents higher at 8.6125.

Bids for US 1 Soft White Wheat delivered to Portland in unit trains or barges during July for ordinary protein trended steady to 10 cents per bushel higher compared to week ago prices for the same delivery period from 5.80-5.95. Some exporters were not issuing bids for nearby delivery.

White club wheat premiums were minus five to zero cents per bushel over soft white wheat bids this week and last week.

One year ago bids for US 1 Soft White Wheat any protein for July delivery by unit trains and barges to Portland were 5.13-5.45 and bids for White Club Wheat were 5.13-5.49.

Forward month bids for soft white wheat ordinary protein were as follows: August New Crop 5.80-5.95, September 5.80-5.98, October 5.85-5.9650 and November 5.85-6.0050.

One year ago, forward month bids for soft white wheat for any protein were as follows: August New Crop 5.18-5.45 and September 5.18-5.53.

Bids for US 1 Soft White Wheat guaranteed maximum 10.5 percent protein during July trended steady to 10 cents per bushel higher com-

pared to week ago prices for the same delivery period from 5.80-5.95. Some exporters were not issuing bids for nearby delivery.

White club wheat premiums for guaranteed maximum 10.5 percent protein soft white wheat this week were zero cents per bushel over soft white wheat bids this week and last week. One year ago bids for US 1 Soft White Wheat guaranteed maximum 10.5 percent protein for July delivery by unit trains and barges to Portland were 5.13-5.40 and bids for White Club Wheat were 5.13-5.40.

Forward month bids for soft white wheat guaranteed 10.5 percent proteins were as follows: August New Crop 5.80-5.95, September 5.80-5.98, October 5.85-5.9650 and November 5.85-6.0050.

One year ago, forward month bids for soft white wheat for any protein were as follows: August New Crop 5.13-5.40, September 5.18-5.45, October 5.3175-5.60 and November 5.3675-5.60.

Bids for 11.5 percent protein US 1 Hard Red Winter Wheat for July delivery trended 27.50 to 32.50 cents per bushel higher than week ago bids for the same delivery period. Some exporters were not issuing bids for nearby delivery. This week, bids were as follows: July 6.44-6.59, August New Crop 6.44-6.59, September 6.44-6.64, October 6.7050-6.8550 and November 6.8050-6.8550.

Bids for non-guaranteed 14.0 percent protein US 1 Dark Northern Spring Wheat for Portland delivery during July trended 51 cents per bushel higher than week ago bids for the same delivery period. Some exporters were not issuing bids for nearby delivery. This week, bids for non-guaranteed 14 percent protein were as follows: July 6.8275-6.8775, August New Crop 6.8275-6.8775, September 6.8775-6.9275, October 7.0175-7.1175 and November 7.0675-7.1175.

Coarse feeding grains: Bids for US 2 Yellow Corn delivered full coast Pacific Northwest - BN shuttle trains for July delivery was not available as there were no bids for July or August delivery. Some exporters were not issuing bids for nearby delivery. Forward month bids were as follows: September 4.5750-4.5950, October 4.6175-4.6375, November 4.6375-4.6575 and December 4.6775-4.6975.

Bids for US 1 Yellow Soybeans delivered full coast Pacific Northwest - BN shuttle trains for July delivery were not available as most ex-

porters were not issuing bids for nearby delivery. Forward month soybean bids were as follows: August not available. Bids for US 2 Heavy White Oats for July delivery trended steady at 3.7750 per bushel.

All Classes cream multiples are 1.09-1.32. However, some customers offered to purchase cream at multiples up to 1.35 but couldn't find any loads.

According to California Department of Food and Agriculture, June 2018 pool receipts of milk in the state total 3.11 billion pounds. This is 0.1 percent lower compared to the same year a year ago. From January through June 2018, receipts are 0.8 percent higher from the comparable period in 2017. The Value at Test price is \$15.41, \$12 lower than the previous month, and \$1.06 below a year ago.

The percentage of receipts used in Class 1 products is 11.73 percent. The June quota price is \$15.94, and the over quota price is \$14.24. These prices are \$0.1 above last month, but \$1.14 lower from a year ago.

The NASS Milk Production report noted June 2018 milk production in the 23 selected states was 17.2 billion pounds, 1.3 percent above a year ago. Milk cows in the 23 selected states totaled 8.75 million head, 12,000 head more than a year ago.
