One by one Medford is giving a black eye to the shipments of the necessities of life into our city by manufacturing the articles herself. There was a time when ice was shipped from outside towns to supply Medford but our lively little city has reversed the order of things and now we do the shipping.

The Medford business college building is nearly completed and with the coming of next September it will be opened as a business college and normal school. As this is the only school of like nature in Southern Oregon its success is an assured fact. Already the management has the assurance of something over an hundred pupils for the fall term and as many more have written regarding terms, it is safe to presume that the building's capacity will be well taxed. A fact which is worthy of consideration and appreciation by our citizens is that while the institution assists materially in advertising our city to the world as THE educational center of Southern Oregon it as well assures the expenditure of many dollars among our merchants that would not otherwise reach them.

There are a great many strangers in and about Medford these days and the major portion of them are mining men. Some of these are well-to-do and very influential and their coming promises much good to our valley. They are men who fully realize our mineral wealth and who are not afraid to invest many dollars in developing it. Such men are entitled to the very best of consideration at the hands of our local miners, but who in some cases are not given of this consideration as liberally as they deserve. Two of these gentlemen are J. H. King and A. H. Jose, of Seattle. These two have been the means, within the last few months, of the investment of no small amount of capital in mining property and as this property is to be developed the money thus expended will tend to the general good of the valley.

Jackson county is becoming a flower supply depot for the whole United States. Scott Morris was in from Spikenard Monday and was telling us that he has arranged to supply wild flowers in great quantities to the publishers of the Rural New Yorker. This paper has a very large circulation and to each of its subscribers it gives as a premium a collection of flower plants which Mr. Morris is now prepared to deliver. The collection consists of four erythronium grandiflorum, or dog toothed violet; two iris—Henderson's iris; and one Washingtonium lily. These will be mailed direct from Spikenard to the subscribers and the number will probably be not less than five thousand. They are very beautiful flowers and are, seemingly, in great demand.

Treaty With Hawaii.

The provisional government of the Hawaiian islands has prepared a treaty regarding future relations with the United States. Following are some of the grounds it covers:
Article I cedes from the date of exchange of the ratification of the treaty, without reserve, all the rights of sovereignty in and over the Hawaiian islands and dependencies to the United States to be become an integral part thereof.
Article II cedes and transfers the absolute fee of all government and crown lands, public buildings, ports, rivers, fortifications, military or naval equipments, and all other public property.
Article III provides that the existing government of the Hawaiian islands, and the laws relating to its internal policy are to be continued for five years, to be executed and carried out under the direction of a United States commissioner appointed by the president and senate, said commissioner to reside in the Hawaiian islands with power to veto within 10 days any act passed by the local government, which shall thereupon become void unless afterward approved by the president of the United States.
Article IV prohibits the immigration of Chinese laborers into the Hawaiian islands until such time as congress shall provide further legislation. It also prohibits Chinese laborers now here from entering the United States, otherwise the immigration and labor laws are to remain as they are where they do not come into conflict with the constitution of the United States, or such future laws as congress may provide.
Article V provides that the public debt shall be assumed by the United States, but the Hawaiian government shall continue to pay interest thereon, congress to provide the future currency of the islands. The government has decided to include the substance of this new treaty draft in the instructions to Commissioner Alexander and Minister Thurston, who will bring the matter before the United States government in the form of suggestions in case President Cleveland decides to finally withdraw the Harrison treaty of annexation and determines to submit a new treaty or some modification of the old.

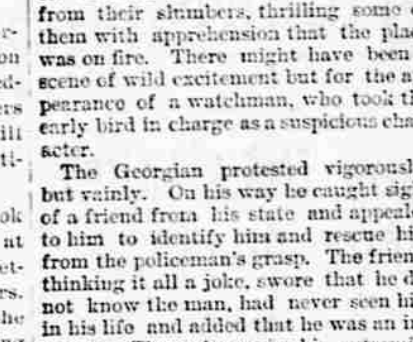
