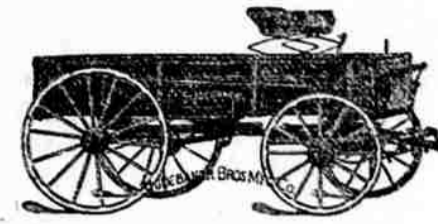

The end of the Durrant trial is near. Last week the defense practically completed its case and the prosecution is now engaged in rebuttal. Durrant was on the witness stand for several days and the cross-examination by District Attorney Barnes was searching in the extreme. In two vital points Durrant became confused. The first was in explaining his motive for going to the ferry on April 12. He said a stranger met him on Post street and told him to watch the ferry for Blanche Lamont. He could not describe the stranger and did not explain why a total stranger should address such a remark to him. In reference to the notes of Dr. Cheney's lecture, at which Durrant claims to have been present when Blanche Lamont left the normal school, he again made hazy and involved explanations. It is now expected that the case will go to the jury the latter part of next week.

Lieutenant Governor Millard is at Shasta Springs under the care of a doctor, who reports him to be in a critical condition. If she should rally so as to be able to bear moving the physician says a change to the seashore of Southern California would improve him.

This is the first sign of activity in the market for this metal in a year or more and authorities say it is due in a measure to purchases for China's account in connection with the war indemnity. Large amounts of silver are being shipped from Mexico through San Francisco to China.
