Visitors to War Ships Show the Great National Characteristic.

DWELLING BUILT OF TUBES.

Remarkable Structure Put Up by a German Inventor—Its Advantages.

A German inventor has built a house of hollow tubes, whose advantages are, he says, a constant temperature and incidentally strength, durability, comfort and beauty, says the New York Sun. He first put up a frame of water tubing, allowing continuous circulation to a stream of water. Around this frame he put up his house in the ordinary way. The peculiarity is that all floors and ceilings are crossed and recrossed by the water pipes. The water, having passed through horizontal tubes under the floor and ceilings, passes through the vertical tubes until all have been gone through. In summer, fresh cool water circulates under pressure through the network of tubes, cools off the walls, and, after having run its course, flows considerably warmer than when it entered. In its course it has absorbed much heat, which it carries away. During the long and severe winter the water entering through the basement is first heated to nearly one hundred degrees and then forced through the tubing. Of course much of the heat is left all over the house, and at the outlet the temperature of the water is about forty degrees. The speed of the circulation of water can be regulated so as to allow the fixing of a certain temperature, which is equal throughout the building.

PHOTOGRAPHING A WINK.

And Reproducing It on a Big Canvas Screen.

Woodville Latham, professor of chemistry at the University of West Virginia, has made an improvement on Edison's kinesiograph. He takes pictures at the rate of forty a second, says the Philadelphia Inquirer, and reproduces them in life size on a screen. Except that the scene takes place in absolute silence the reproduction is very lifelike. With this attachment Prof. Latham has reproduced a wink.

He also reproduced a round of a prize fight lasting twelve minutes, which needs only a little prize-fight slang scattered through the atmosphere to make an exact reproduction of the real.

Even the slightest motion can be reproduced. The act of snapping the fingers can be photographed four times. Otway Latham has a scene in which a man is smoking a pipe. The smoke from it can be seen on the canvas. A photographer was out one day recently with a street piano player for the purpose of catching children dancing to the music. That will be reproduced. An effort will be made to reproduce the execution of Buchanan, if he is executed, for scientific purposes.

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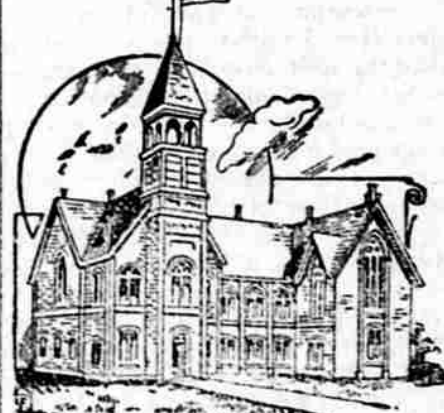
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
