Letter from J. S. Howard.

FLAGSTAFF, Ariz., Oct. 23, '97. EDITOR MAIL:—According to my promise I will write you a few lines, though our new and strange experiences may not be interesting to your readers, but having lived so long and known many so long I feel as though I would like to talk to them a little anyway.

After leaving Medford on the 7th inst., nothing of interest occurred until our arrival at Los Angeles, that beautiful city of the angels. We arrived Saturday morning and in the afternoon Ben (B. S. Webb) took us around in his landulet to see the city—and such a beautiful place in the edge of the desert.

On the 11th inst. we boarded the train en route for Tucson, Arizona, and were speeding across the great desert waste in strange contrast with the grassy and flowery lawns of Los Angeles.

From Tucson our next place was Phoenix, in the central southern portion, in Salt river valley. Here we saw ranch after ranch, all green with great fields of alfalfa, and great bands of fat cattle and now then an orange grove—all the result of irrigation, which shows what could be done with the Rogue river desert, which is just as good soil, if it were irrigated.

After leaving Phoenix we went north up to the Santa Fe Pacific road through a great desert country without water. We then went west towards the California line to Hackberry. This is a dry country, the railroad hauling water some places 75 miles for their trains.

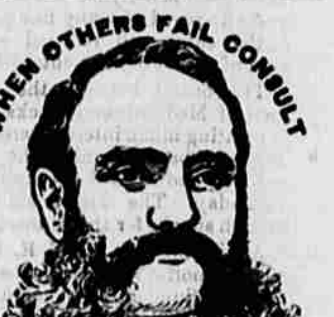
