## Annual School Meeting.

Last Monday was school meeting day in Medford-and, gee whillikins, what a crowd there was in attendancepeople than one school room could hold. including hallway and stairs.

The meeting was called to order by the chairman of the directors, Mr. N 1st and November 1st, be prohibited, B. Bradbury, Clerk Garl T. Jones was called upon for his annual report which was read and upon motion was ap proved.

The election of one school director was then in order and W. S. Crowell and G. L. Webb were placed in nomiof North B street, from Seventh to nation. Ballots were prepared by W. Third street and then east two blocks T. York and W. H. Meeker, who were appointed tellers. There were 152 votes cast of which Mr. Crowell received 93, Mr. Webb 56, scattering and blank 3. Mr. Crowell declared elected. Garl T. Jones was re-elected clerk by acclama

tion The directors asked for an expression of opinion upon three points. One of these was as to the advisability of purchasing a small tract of land adjoining the school property on the south, for additional play ground for the pupils in which to of the school. The price asked for this conductor. property is \$225, of which amount J. R. Erford, who is agent for the property, The directors were instructed to act their pleasure in the matter. The matter of the town's assessment of \$150 for sewerage across school grounds was also talked of and the directors were ordered graded and graveled. This advised to act their pleasure. The notes for \$19,000 become due next December and the board was directed to call a meeting of the voters at least thirty days prior to that time for the purpose of devising means for meeting the payment of these notes. The pre sumption being that money can be se cured to take them up at a less rate of interest than seven per cent, the interest now being paid. It was thought by some that a better way would be to issue school warrants for the full amount. These would bear but six per cent interest and could in all probability be sold at a premlum. One of the redeeming features as regards war rants is that they can be taken up at any time, and they are not taxable. As will be seen by the following report of Clerk Jones the indebtedness of

the school district has been reduced \$2520.37 during the past year. This is a splendid showing and the directors, Messrs. D. T. Lawton, J. R. Wilson and N. B. Bradbury, are entitled to commendatio , from the taxpayers for the economical manner in which they have conducted the affairs of the district. Here is the


