The Democratic County convention met at the court house in Jacksonville, Saturday, April 25, at 11:30 o'clock a. m. and was called to order by Joseph Bosman, secretary of county central committee. W. M. Colvig was chosen temporary chairman, and Geo. Hoffman temporary secretary.
A committee of five, consisting of John Orth, Wm. Wilkins, A. N. Solles, J. A. Whitman and W. Klippel, was appointed on credentials.
On order of business the following gentlemen were appointed: Wm. Slinger, John Olwell, Jas. Riley, Jas. Garvin and J. R. Tosier.
Convention adjourned until one o'clock on re-convening, the committee on credentials reported that the following gentlemen were entitled to seats in the convention.

The committee on order of business and permanent organization recommended that the temporary organization be made permanent and that the nomination of officers be in the following order: County Judge, Sheriff, Clerk, Recorder, Treasurer, Assessor, School Superintendent, County Commissioner, County Surveyor, Representatives, Coroner, Selection of a county central committee. Reseal adopted.
A committee of three, representing the fusionists of the county, and consisting of W. E. Marksberry, J. S. McCall and W. E. Anderson, appeared before the convention and asked that a conference committee of three be appointed by the convention to confer with them upon matters appertaining to the nominating of officers. The convention appointed as such committee Jas. Riley, H. Mann and T. E. Nichols. Thirty minutes recess was taken.
Conference committee reported that fusionists concede the county judge to the democrats and asked that a good ticket be put up, and that further the populists wanted representation on the ticket. A debate followed, at the close of which the report was adopted. J. Nunan and John Olwell were appointed tellers.
J. R. Neil and Chas. Prim were placed in nomination for county judge. Neil received 13 votes; Prim, 27.
W. H. Brunk was nominated for sheriff by acclamation.
L. L. Jacobs and Fred Furry were nominated for county clerk. The ballots gave Jacobs 29; Furry, 20.
W. O. Marks was nominated by acclamation for county recorder.
Martin McDonough was nominated by acclamation for assessor.
L. A. Stocking and K. K. Kubil were named for school superintendent. Stocking received 35 votes; Kubil, 13.
G. F. Lindley for commissioner, L. S. Treifan for surveyor, J. H. Gay for treasurer, and J. E. Shearer for coroner, were nominated by acclamation.
For representatives, J. Bosman and J. L. Bachelor were nominated by acclamation.
City Council Proceedings.
The city council met in regular session Tuesday evening of this week—with a full board.
A bicycle remonstrance, to the petition handed in at the April meeting was upon motion laid on the table until the next meeting. The petition asked that bicycle riding be prohibited on all sidewalks of the city. The remonstrance asks that the bicycle ordinance remain as it now stands.
Petition of W. S. Jones and others asking for an extension of electric light system to East Medford was laid on the table until next meeting.
Upon motion the recorder was placed on a salary of \$33.33 per month, he to do all collecting, keep record and to conduct all business in recorder's court.
Upon motion J. R. Erford was allowed \$10 per month for superintending the Electric Light plant.
Surveyor was instructed to establish grades for grading D and E streets from Third to Seventh.
Superintendent Erford was instructed to have telephone put in at the pumping station.
The Sugar Leaf Creamery, Coos County, has resumed operations. It will handle 10,000 to 15,000 pounds of milk daily as soon as the roads are good, and will make cheese principally.
