In Memory of B. F. Miller.

Benjamin F. Miller was born in Hamilton County, Ohio, on July 31, 1832, and died April 15, 1900, at his home on Galla creek, Jackson County, where he was engaged in mining. Mr. Miller, like all ambitious young men, wanted to see a newer country, and left the home of his youth at the age of twenty years, going to Illinois, where he spent two years; then with a desire to seek the gold fields of the Pacific slope, he crossed the plains in 1854 with Capt. John Sutton, and engaged in mining at Sterlingville, Jackson County, in the winter and spring of 1855.

On May 14, 1857, Mr. Miller was united in marriage to Margaret J. Sutton, daughter of Capt. John Sutton. During all the years of hardship and toil incident to the life of an early pioneer and the mingling with the rougher element of the world, he never forgot his manhood nor the principles instilled in him from youth by his Christian parents. In the year 1865 he was converted to the religion of the Lord Jesus Christ and united with the M. E. Church, of which he was a consistent and conscientious member until his death. It can be truly said of him that he died as he had lived, in the full belief of a happier life beyond this vale of tears. He has gone home to meet father, mother, sisters and children who have gone before, and by his death the community has lost an honest and upright citizen, loved and respected by all who knew him. Mr. Miller leaves to mourn his demise a wife, two daughters, Mrs.

B. W. Dean, of Curry County, and Miss Maggie Miller, who was at home with her parents, and one son, J. T. Miller, of Sardine creek. He also leaves two brothers and three sisters—E. H. Miller, of Los Angeles, Calif.; C. E. Miller, of this county; Mrs. Mary J. Risley, of Clinton County, Iowa; Mrs. Almira Hopkins, of Powers County, Colorado, and Mrs. Eva M. Newton, of Sardine creek, this county. While they mourn the loss of a husband, a father, a brother, they feel that their loss is his gain; that God doeth all things well.

WOMAN'S IDLE TEARS.

The Modern Heroine of Fiction Is No Longer a Weeping Weakling.

What has become of woman's tears, idle tears? A cynical old bachelor lately remarked in the hearing of a woman that the crying members of her sex. He said that he had not seen a woman cry in some years, and that, so far as he could see, there are just as many things to cry over as there ever were, and just as many women. He did not object to the absence of tears; he only wondered about it.

This thing has received attentions of various kinds before now. It was first noticed in the novels. The young woman in modern fiction does not do nearly so much weeping as she used to do. To be sure, she has not always so much excuse for it. When a young lady was carried away by a fierce and determined lover whom she did not want, and told that unless she married him at once her family and all her immediate friends would be killed, there was really a considerable excuse for tears and swoons on her part. This type of heroine flourished in the beginning of the present century. She was followed by the heroine who cried as a child does to get something she wanted—and usually got it, if it happened not to be the moon or anything equally unattainable.

Sometimes she was a young lady of religious predilections and shed tears over the sorrows of others, or over her own religious sentiments. It has been estimated by careful statisticians that Miss Ellen Montgomery, heroine of "The Wide, Wide World," must have shed at least five gallons, two quarts and a pint of tears in the course of her adventures in two volumes. But the young lady in the modern work of fiction does not cry. If she is of a passionate nature she now and then "bursts into a storm of sobs," but she does not often do it, as old-fashioned people would say, "before folks." She is more likely to preserve a calm and more or less uncomprehended silence. Another type of modern heroine is the cheery girl who endures all her tribulations in silence, or laughs about them, and is the sunshine of the family circle while her heart is secretly breaking. It must be confessed that this type of young lady would be considerably more to the taste of the ordinary man than the old-fashioned type of tearful patience. The "man's woman"—courageous, gay, tolerant and reserved as to her private feelings—is coming to the front in fiction, and this ideal is decidedly worth studying by the novel-reading girls of to-day.—Chicago Chronicle.
