Mr. Damon's Sojourn in California.

We left Medford April 4th, and arrived at Oroville on April 5th, at 3:20 a. m., nothing worthy of note transpiring on the trip. From Oroville we drove out about twelve miles to an orange grove and chicken ranch. Here we picked our first oranges. Here, too, we found chickens in all stages, from coming out of the shell to three months old. They had three incubators, each with a capacity of from 150 to 300 eggs. The chickens were very tame and were all healthy and in good condition.

From here we drove to Feather river to look at the dredgers. I had always thought a dredger was a machine to take mud and dirt out of river bottoms and harbors, but here it was different. Some of them were out on the main land, floating around in water taken from irrigation ditches, for which water they pay as high as \$50 per month. The first dredger built cost \$40,000 and has a capacity of only one-fourth of some of the others, yet the Saturday night before they had cleaned up \$9600 as the result of a six days' run. This dredger was supplied with a steam shovel which brought the gravel and mud from under about sixteen feet of water and dumped it onto a gigantic rocker, where the gravel, sand and gold were washed out from the rocks, which were then piled up behind the machine by an elevator made after the fashion of an old separator for piling up straw. The mud and sand were washed over a long series of riffles for saving the gold. They were not content with simply going down to the bedrock, but the ponderous shovel trims off the upper six inches as though it were cheese, and from this most of the gold is secured. The dredger that I was aboard of was the largest one there, and was recently completed at a cost of \$75,000. It will be run by electricity, which has been contracted for at \$1750 per month for 850 horse-power. The timber in it was all procured in Oregon. The ground where these dredgers were at work had all been worked in early days. They have eight dredgers at work and several more are to be built this summer.

My next trip was into the orange, olive, fig, lemon and almond groves. There was fruit in all stages on the trees except the olive. I find that the men that have the most pride about them are the ones that have the most beautiful groves and homes; the energy and the intelligent industry of the inhabitants is what tells wherever you go.

On the 23d of April was the commencement of the grand parlor of the Native Sons of the Golden West, and the people came from all over California. Oroville was beautifully decorated with flowers and there were three large arches built across the streets which were decorated with electric lights. On Thursday there was a parade of floats, representing almost everything you can think of. On Friday came the parade of flowers and the crowning of the queen, with appropriate speaking and singing, which closed with a reception in the I. O. O. F. hall. At the conclusion of each day's session the committee on entertainment had carriages for all who wished to ride and the surrounding roads were full of gay parties taking in the sights of Butte County.

There will be an abundance of fruit in this valley as they have had lots of rain within the past month. Grass and hay are green and looking fine all through the Sacramento valley and I counted eight, ten and fourteen-horse teams in the same field, one after the other.

GERMAN BLONDES.

They Form the Largest Per Cent. of the Types of Germany's Population.

The German Anthropological society has been engaged in recent years in collecting statistics relative to the comparative frequency of the blonde and brunette types and their distribution through the German empire.

The results are of interest as giving evidence of the original sources of the population in various sections. The observations were confined to school children, 6,000,000 of whom have been examined.

For purposes of classification only those that had blue eyes and fair hair and skin were counted as blondes, and those whose eyes, hair and skin were all dark, as brunettes.

All others (for example, children with dark eyes and light hair or with blue eyes and dark hair and skin) were put in a third or "mixed" class.

In the empire as a whole the blondes were found to number 31.8 per cent., the brunettes, 14 per cent., and the mixed types, 54.2 per cent. In some districts the preponderance of the blonde element was much more marked—especially in a part of the Grand Duchy of Oldenburg, where there were only four per cent. of pure brunettes.

The effect of the brunette, Roman element was distinctly marked in the southern and southwestern parts of the empire. Near Worms and Speyer, indeed, one often sees faces which strongly suggest those of central Italy or Roman statues and paintings.

Yet streaks of blonde preponderance, apparently marking the paths of German migration, were traced up to the Italian frontier.

IDEA TOO ORIGINAL.

The Mayor Suggested That the Town's Visitors Climb the New Standpipe for Entertainment.

In one of the towns of the upper peninsula they were preparing to entertain a delegation of eastern capitalists, many of them accompanied by wives and families, who were prospecting for investments in mining, railroad and other enterprises. At the meeting to make arrangements for the reception the new mayor presided. He had ideas of his own, says the Detroit Journal, and evidently thought that his official position entitled him to settle any disputed question. After several plans had been suggested, he took the floor.

"Gentlemen," said his honor, "what I insist upon is something original and something that these people will always recall as having happened right here. Our neighbors in the east dropped them a few thousand feet into a copper mine; our rival city to the north drove them six miles to see the water works; at that struggling little burg west of us they gave them a chance to blister their faces over the red sandstone quarries. We're no imitators. What I propose is that we let them climb, at a time, to the top of that new standpipe of ours. They'll know we're up to date on our fire department and they'll get a splendid view of the surrounding country."

And it took the leading men of both parties to get the mayor's consent to another programme.

Spanish Cruelty.

The cruelty of the Spaniard, or rather his callousness, his recklessness of the lives of others, and even of his own is another medieval and oriental survival; and then, too, there underlies the Spanish temperament I know not what vein of primitive Iberian savagery. Mme. d'Aulnoy relates that on a certain day of the year it was customary for court gallants to run along one of the main streets of Madrid, lashing furiously their bare shoulders; and when one of these penitents passed the lady of his choice among the spectators, he bespattered her with his blood as a special mark of his favor. Insensibility to the suffering of animals, though general in Spain, is not any greater, so far as my own observations go, than in the other Latin countries. Possibly, medieval religions, in so exalting man above other creatures, in refusing to recognize his relation to the rest of nature, tended to increase this lack of sympathy with brute creation. The Spanish peasant belabors his ass for the same reason that Malebranche kicked his dog—because he has not learned to see in it a being organized to feel pain in the same way as himself.—Irving Babbitt, in Atlantic.
