THE PHILIPPINES.

MANILA, May 20.—Five hundred insurgents, half of whom were armed with rifles, ambushed 80 soldiers of the Fortieth volunteer infantry in the hills near Agusan, in the northern part of Mindanao. The Americans routed the natives, killing 51. The American casualties were two killed and three wounded.

NEW YORK, May 20.—A cable to the Sun from Manila says: The Sultan of Mindanao has asked General Kobbie to approve the selection of Dato Mandi as heir to the Sultana. Dato Mandi is a good friend to the Americans.

A telegram from Koping, Sweden, reports that as the steamer Koping was passing the Prinz Carl a man sprang upon the deck of the latter vessel and shouted: "If any one comes near I will shoot!" At the same moment a woman was seen hanging over the ship's side, shrieking for help. The man escaped in a boat. When the Prinz Carl was boarded it was found that 12 men on board had been shot, six of whom, including the captain were dead. The rest were found locked in their quarters. One of the wounded has since died. The murderer has been captured, but does not state what prompted the crime.

A terrible accident, resulting in the death of from 90 to 40 persons, took place at Ronciglione on the lake of Vico, Italy, during a celebration of the feast of St. Lucia, whose chapel is on the shore of the lake. Two boats filled with young people capsized while returning from the chapel within 500 yards of the landing stage. Only 18 persons were saved.

The dead bodies of Mrs. Thomas Moser, wife of a farmer living three miles north of Tremont, Ill., and her four small children were found in their home some days ago. Their throats were cut from ear to ear. Moser has disappeared, but there is no known evidence pointing to his having committed the terrible crime. No trace of the murderer has been found, although some of the neighbors are convinced that Moser wiped out his family in a fit of insanity.

Senator Clark of Montana accomplished a remarkable coup a few days ago. Just as the senate was prepared to take up for final action the report of the committee recommending that his seat be declared vacant, the Montana senator took the floor and announced his resignation. His action won him the warm congratulations of his colleagues, who were greatly impressed by his frank course. The following night Lieutenant-Governor Sprigg, who is acting governor of Montana in the absence of Governor Smith, appointed Clark to fill the vacancy created by his resignation. In taking this action Sprigg is said to have gone in direct opposition to Governor Smith's desires. The action the senate will take is uncertain.

The California Construction company has announced its intention of rushing work on the San Pedro break water, and are to have things well under way within 80 days from the time the contract is approved by the Washington officials. While trying to shoot the rapids in a canoe at Kingston dam, about two miles from Princeton, N. J., Philip Kingsland Hay of Nutley, N. J., and Christopher C. Angur of Evanston, Ill., members of the sophomore class, were drowned. Angur's body was recovered.

Secretary Root recently explained to the house military committee the advantages that would accrue from the passage of the army reorganization bill. He dealt especially on the proposed increase of the artillery arm and the increased rank given Generals Miles and Corbin. The situation now is serious for seacoast fortifications was just as foolish and impracticable, the secretary said, as that would be of a man who built a fine house, equipped in the most perfect manner, and then went away and left it to take care of itself. There are millions and millions invested in fortifications, he said, with no one to take care of them, involving depreciation from lack of attention.

Former Queen Liluokalani of Hawaii is on the way to her home at Honolulu where she will reside permanently. Russia has shipped 100,000 coolies from China to Manchuria to construct the railway to Port Arthur. The fortifications at Port Arthur are progressing rapidly.

Jack Hayes, the mate of the American bark St. James, now on her way to San Francisco in charge of Captain Tapley, who was smuggled aboard the vessel in a barrel, was convicted in the United States circuit court at New York of treating 19 sailors of the bark in a cruel and inhuman manner. On a charge of assault that had been preferred against Hayes, the jury found him not guilty. Sentence was deferred. Captain Tapley was wanted as a witness against Hayes, and for that reason eluded the marshal sent to subpoena him.

John Ashby Tutt, a well-known pioneer of Woodland, is dead.

Ebner Haight Woolsey, a pioneer of Oakland, died of asthma a few days ago.

Dell O. Dodge, a 30-year-old bookkeeper of Seattle, committed suicide there some days ago. No cause for the act is known.
