FED BY TRICKERY.

Thrilling Experience of Snake-keeper With His Charges.

In a Tight Place with the Snake-Makes an Ugly Tree Snake But by Exerting Her Anger.

Queer and thrilling are the methods employed at the reptile house in Bronx zoological park in satisfying the eccentric appetites of the snakes, as recounted by Keeper Charles Snyder, who has charge of the north cases in the reptile house. These cages contain most of the big snakes, and the poisonous species. Snyder has only been in the zoological park since August, but he has acquired plenty of experience.

A few days ago he emerged from the cobra's cage, where he had been nonchalantly seated upon the edge of the bathing tank, feeding the formidable inmates with fishes, which he presented to them upon a pair of forceps. He was asked how he felt during the performance.

"Oh, these fellows are easy," he replied. "They wouldn't bite. It's the diamond rattlers and the cottonmouths that keep a bead on you all the time, and wait for a chance to do business. When I go into the cage with those fellows to clean up, or to repair the damage when a ten-pound snake has tried to roost on one of the Chief Forster's pet rubber plants, I cover the beasts over with soap boxes."

"We have some pretty lively times in the cages once in awhile. Day before yesterday I had orders to go into the cobra's cage to rub some vasoline on the cobra's nose. 'The Ghost' is our white cobra constrictor. She had been trying to bore her way out of the ventilator, and had skinned the front of her face. I threw a blanket over her mate, and caught her by the neck. She put up a pretty stiff fight, but I was getting along all right when I felt something on my shoulder. I was kneeling down at the time, and when I looked around I saw that the male, the tan-colored one, had lit out and was going to crawl over me. He's a regular fiend when he gets mad, and I didn't dare move. I stuck in that position for about ten minutes, holding 'The Ghost' by the neck, while the big fellow crawled over my shoulder and over into a corner, where he coiled up. He stopped a couple of times, and it was hardly a pleasant thing to think of what he might do. I was pretty stiff when I got up, and that's the only thing you can do in such a case."

"We've been having lots of fun lately in feeding our yellow tree snake. She's about the most stubborn beast in the collection. She came in last October from Trinidad, and refused to take any food, so we stuffed her—that is, we forced some fish down her throat. Then we tried some other tactics. She is an awful biter, and she has such long teeth that when she grabs hold of anything she can't let go for a minute. A few days ago we stirred her up a bit, and then let her snap at a fish on a stick. It caught in her teeth, and she held on. Then, finding all of a sudden that she had something to eat in her mouth, she swallowed it. We followed this with about a dozen more. It worked like a charm. All we have to do when we want to feed her now is to pinch her tail, and at the same time poke a fish at her. The fish goes every time when we do this, but if she isn't in a temper she won't even look at the fish."

"Do you have any trouble in procuring food for your snakes?" Snyder was asked.

"Yes, for some of the new ones, but after they've been in our care for a time we don't have any trouble. Some of the rat-eating snakes will live rats, but they don't get them except at pretty long intervals. We keep a few rats on hand, and when we want to feed a rattler we take a long strip of beef, clip a little hair from a live rat, and sprinkle it over the meat. The snake smells the rat's fur and dives in without loss of time. As for the rat, he doesn't mind being sheared at all, but seems to like it after awhile. We often work the same racket on bird-eating snakes. In this case we have some of the smaller feathers from a chicken on hand, which we sprinkle over the meat."—N. Y. Times.

Health of Navy and Marine.

Health of the United States navy and marine corps is reported upon by the surgeon general of the navy in his annual report, which shows that in the fiscal year 1898, notwithstanding war conditions and prolonged cruising in tropical waters, the ratio of admission to the sick list per 1,000 shows but a slight increase over past years. The ratio for 1898 was 87.69 per 1,000, as compared with 838 per 1,000 in 1895, 777.75 in 1896 and 748.24 in 1897. There were 173 deaths in the year, 118 being from disease and 55 from injury. Excluding the men lost on the Maine, the death rate was only 7.21 per 1,000.—Chicago Evening News.

Carlson South American Poison.

The Indians of South America use a curious poison, which is called ezeal. A grain of it has the effect of starting an irresistible desire for exertion. The victim begins walking briskly round and round in small circles till he drops dead in his tracks. There is no pain, but much excitement.—Cleveland Plain Dealer.

An ice cream merchant of Honolulu, finding business dull, wandered out one day and seized an unoccupied island in the Pacific ocean. He claims ownership of the same under the squatter sovereignty act, and the government cannot dislodge him.—Cleveland Leader.

Austria's Crown.

Post Office in a Rock.

Recently, consequent on the institution of a house-to-house delivery of letters in the district of Morven, Argyleshire, one of the most primitive post offices in the United Kingdom has fallen into desuetude. It had never received the sanction of the postmaster general, nor was it amenable to any of the stringent rules governing other offices. Situated high up among the lonely hills, half way between Drimmin and Barr, and about three miles from the nearest habitation, it consisted of a simple slit in the rock, closed up by a nicely fitting stone. In the good old times, and, indeed, until quite recently, when any letters for Barr and neighboring places came to Drimmin post office they were carried by the first available shepherd or crofter to this isolated depository in the rock. Here they were left, sometimes for many days, until there should happen to come that way some other shepherd or crofter who might feel inclined to find it convenient to deliver them at their destination.—N.
