The Bonds Were Voted.

Last Monday was election day in Medford, the election having been held for the purpose of deciding whether or not the taxpayers wanted to issue new bonds in payment of those now outstanding and for the redemption of outstanding eight per cent warrants. The vote polled was decidedly a light one—there being only 130 cast. Of these 102 were for bonding and 28 against.

In West Medford 62 votes were cast. Forty seven of these were for bonds and fifteen against.

East Medford cast 68 votes; fifty-five for and thirteen against.

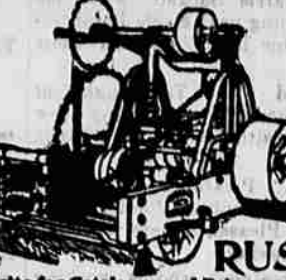
