TRADING IN THE TRANSVAAL.

White Customers Will Generally Be Treated, But the Blacks Are Regarded with Less Concern.

Ordinarily the Transvaal trading store is of galvanized iron, upon which the sun beats down with all its intensity, making the air within almost unbearable. But the trader does not mind this. Dressed in a pair of trousers, a light pair of shoes and a flannel shirt, he reclines on a convenient part of the counter, and with the aid of his pipe passes the time until a customer arrives, says the New York Herald.

Should the customer be a white man, the storekeeper and he will as a rule retire into a little side room for a few minutes, and a bottle and a couple of glasses will be produced. Should he, on the other hand, be a negro, the trader will glance at him casually, and, without moving, will ask him what he wants. He does this because Kaffirs often want something which they know the storekeeper has not got. The shelves in the back of the shop are piled up with gaudy blankets, clothing of all descriptions, tinned goods, clocks and vases, cheap "jewelry," and various other commodities. Below these shelves are the bins where the sugar, flour, meal and coffee are kept. On one side are small shelves where patent medicines stand.

Outside the door, on the stoop, are the agricultural implements, plows, harrows, new American inventions of all sizes and descriptions that are too big or too heavy to be easily carried away.
