The Cid of Spanish Legend

THE Cid of Spanish legend, the Cid of legend, romance and drama, the Cid of a hundred thousand battles, the Cid of famous Spanish epic, the Cid invoked by all Spaniards, good and bad, at all times when the nation is in danger, and whose very name inspires the tired soldier on to victory, and has ever been perpetual in inspiring Spanish patriotism, is a mythological character in Spanish tradition that has doubtless grown from the real character of Rodrigo Diaz De Bivar—a sort of freebooter and rebel whose daring bravery and many victories won him the name of The Cid, or "The Lord." The people not only worshiped this perfect one while he lived, but in all the ages since they have sung his praises in song and ballad until to-day among the Spanish soldiers he is the invincible, magnanimous, all-powerful "My Cid," who is the type of all manly virtue, the mirror of all patriotic duty, and the blossoming flower of all Christian grace. He is everything. He is almost the Christ as the Jews would have had him. He is Napoleon, Wellington and Nelson, and Washington, Lincoln and Lee all in one.

In all the other nations of the world, not excepting King Arthur, of English legend, there is no character that holds the place of that of the Cid in Spanish literature. In fact, most of all the Spanish classics are built around some story of his mythological life. The song of the Cid that was chanted by the wandering minstrels in the twelfth century has survived to be hymned in the odes of the Spanish soldier to-day. They believe just as firmly as they believe in God that the Cid will deliver them finally victorious from the hands of the Americans in this present war.

Within a hundred years of his death the Cid had become the center of hundreds of myths. The "Poem Del Cid," written in the latter half of the twelfth century, has scarcely any trace of historical character. The poem of the Cid is but a fragment of 3,744 lines, written in barbarous style, in rugged assonant rhymes, and a rude Alexandrine measure, but it glows with the pure fire of poetry, and is full of a noble simplicity and a true epic value and grandeur, and is invaluable as a living picture of the age. Most of the ballads of the Cid are extinct. There were at one time over 200 of them; to-day, however, there are not more than a half dozen that can be traced without doubt over a few centuries back. One of the most beautiful of these is given further on. All these ballads take great liberties with history, thus belaying the opinion of Sancho Panza that "the ballads are too old to tell lies."

The real Cid of history, although falling short of the poetical ideal which his countrymen have bestowed upon him, was a great warrior, gaining his name in the long struggle between the Christians and the Moslem. He was born at Bivar, from which he derives his name Rodrigo Diaz de Bivar, of a noble family, some time between the years 1030 and 1040. His exploits were great, but nevertheless he was a man with human power. From this person, however, doubtless started all the beautiful Spanish legends that hover about the Cid.

While these legends, written in both prose and poetry, are very beautiful and form a great part of Spanish literature, they cannot be relied upon, and some aspiring Spanish author is continually discovering a new one, doubtless concocted in his own brain. There is one beautiful story of his birth that tells of his mother praying to the Virgin to give her a son. She continued her prayer day after day until one morning she begins her prayers over a beautiful red rose, and while praying her tears drop on its petals and turn them white. When she stops her prayers and glances downward, she finds in the heart of the white rose she finds a little wee baby nestling among the immaculate petals. Such was the birth of the Cid.

Like our own great men, the famous hero of Spain is represented as exhibiting on so many occasions great gentleness of disposition and compassion. The following ballad, "The Cid and the Leper," will not only serve as an example of this, but also of the quaint beauty of the lines of the old Spanish songs:

I.
He had 'a'en some twenty gentlemen,
Along with him to go,
For he will pay the ancient vow he to Saint James doth owe,
To Compostela, where the shrine doth by the altar stand.
The good Rodrigo de Bivar is riding through the land.

II.
Where'er he goes, much alms he throws,
To feeble folk and poor;

beside the way for him they pray, him blessing to procure.
For God and Mary mother, their Heavenly grace to win,
His Lord was ever bountiful; great was his joy therein.

III.
And there, in middle of the path, a leper did appear:
In a deep slough the leper lay, none would to help come near.
With a loud voice he thence did cry: "For God, our Saviour's sake,
From out the fearful jeopardy a Christian brother take."

IV.
When Rodrigo heard that piteous word, he from his horse came down;
For all they said, no stay he made, that noble champion.
He reached his hand to pluck him forth, of fear was no account.
Then mounted on his steed of worth, and made the leper mount.

V.
Behind him rode the leprous man; when to their hostelry they came,
He made him eat with him at table cheerfully.
While all the rest from the poor guest with loathing shrunk away,
To his own bed the wretch he led, beside him there he lay.

VI.
All at the mid-hour of the night, while good Rodrigo slept,
A breath came from the leprous man, it through his shoulders crept;
Right through the body, at the breast, passed forth that breathing cold;
I wot he leaped up with a start in terrors manifold.

VII.
He groped for him in the bed, but him he could not find,
Through the dark chamber groped he, with very anxious mind;
Loudly he lifted up his voice, with speed a lamp he brought.
Yet nowhere was the leper seen, though far and near they sought.

VIII.
He turned him to his chamber, Got wot, perplexed and sore
With that which had befallen—when lo! his face before,
There stood a man all clothed in vesture shining white.
Thus said the vision: "Sleepest thou, or wakest thou, Sir Knight?"

IX.
"I sleep not," quoth Rodrigo; "but tell me who art thou."
For, in the midst of darkness, much light is on thy brow?"
"I am the holy Lazarus, I come to speak with thee;
I am the same poor leper thou savedst for charity."

X.
"Not vain the trial, nor in vain thy victory God favors thee, for that my pain thou didst relieve yestern."
There shall be honor with thee, in battle and in peace,
Success in all thy doings, and plentiful increase."

The poem contains a few verses more in which the "happy ever afterward" ending is given. It is thought that from this James Russell Lowell conceived the idea of "The Vision of Sir Launfal."

There is also another beautiful story of his marriage with Ximene, the daughter of the count of Oviedo, and granddaughter to Alfonso the V. Although a great soldier and a mighty statesman the Cid was not ashamed of the most gentle things of life, and his soul was full of true sentiment. The story goes that when the Cid was telling the dark-eyed Spanish girl of his love that she was holding in her hand several white native roses, and that the maiden's blushing turned them crimson. Afterward these roses did not fade as roses usually do, but lasted until the wedding. While the ceremony was being performed they gradually turned pure white again, and they were ever afterward called the bride's roses.

The origin of this legend is unknown, and is doubtless the product of some late author's brain, as it cannot be found in any of the older chronicles.

Like all great and ambitious soldiers who have tried to conquer the world, after his first great defeat, the Cid died of anger and grief about 1099. It was after the battle of Cuena, at which his army was completely routed. After much disturbance, the body of the Cid lies in the center of a small chapel in Burgos. Here the truest of Spanish heroes, the embodiment of all the national virtues and most of the national vice, lies in great state upon a large slab. The body was bound by gold rings to a wooden cross and placed there surrounded by his companions in war. To-day old time and relic seekers have left only the rings and the small bits of wood that cling to them. Philip II. tried to have him canonized, but Rome objected. With all of his virtues the Cid was not the fit person for a saint.

Such is the story, veracious and otherwise, of the greatest of the guerrilleros in legend and in history, of the greatest type of the rebel, the bandit and warrior from the days of Sertorius to those of El Empeinado. The one man whose life has gone more to form the destiny, history and literature of a nation than any other human being that has ever lived.—Louisville Courier-Journal.

New Belts.
The shirt waists, and handsome odd waists, have brought the belt into an enviable position of elegance. Some of the recently imported models are worthy the prices demanded, since they are of exquisite workmanship and of the most artistic conception of form and colorings. The new buckle is quite large, but broad rather than high, invisibly cloring and extending well across the front of the girdle. Gilt, steel and pearl are handsomely wrought, but the newest and most beautiful are in oxidized, enameled, copper and antique effects. Cameos cut from lava, or the shell of the female cameo, are cut in high relief, usually a single medallion, and set in elaborate Moorish, Byzantine, Venetian, Egyptian or East Indian buckles, showing enamels of truly wonderful colorings, considering that they are not classed with jewelry proper. These buckles are used with silk webbing or velvet belt straps, from one to two inches in width, and of any color shown in nature or conceived by ingenious art.—Boston Herald.

NEWS OF THE WORLD.

HAPPENINGS OF THE PAST FEW DAYS FROM ALL QUARTERS.

Ex-Secretary Powers Found Guilty and Sentenced to Life Imprisonment—Lord Roberts's Severe Proclamation—Thrift of a Large Amount of Money.

The transport Indiana has reached Taku and the troops it carried have been sent to the front.

Heavy rains in Yavapai county, Ariz., have caused the streams to fill and all danger of drought is now passed.

Rev. Charles O. Brown, formerly of the Congregational church at San Francisco, who he created a great stir a few years ago in connection with some young women of the congregation, was quietly divorced in Chicago recently, his wife charging him with adultery. He has since been married to a Mrs. Malloy, a widow of means.

An express package containing \$35,000 in currency was stolen from a safe in an Adams Express car some distance from Burlington, Ia. The package of money was forwarded from the Commercial National Bank of Chicago and was billed to one of the large banking institutions of Burlington. When the end of the run was reached the bills were missing from the package and a number of blank sheets of paper put in their place.

A young man living in the Tennessee mountains has found a cure for rattlesnake bites. It is a weed known as "gall of the earth." He allows reptiles to bite him, applies the weed, and no ill effects appear. Several of his friends have been cured of poisonous bites by the application.

James N. Burnham, a publisher of Wymore, Neb., shot and killed his father last Sunday. The elder Burnham was drunk and attacked his son with a butcher knife. When there was no escape the son shot, killing the old man instantly. He acted in self-defense and was exonerated by a jury.

Lord Roberts's proclamation issued at Pretoria, reciting the fact that many have broken the oath to maintain neutrality and that the leniency extended to the burghers in not appreciated, warns all who break their oaths in the future that they will be punished by death, imprisonment or fine. He declares that all burghers in districts occupied by the British, except those who take the oath, will be regarded as prisoners of war and transported, and that buildings on farms where the enemy or his scouts are harbored will be liable to be razed.

The extremely heavy rainfall in all parts of Iowa in the last four days has become a serious menace to crops. The Des Moines river has risen ten feet. The lowlands are flooded and many bridges have been swept away.

The trustees of the Des Moines, Ia., Baptist college, who are seeking to raise an endowment fund of \$100,000, have just been notified by John D. Rockefeller that he will give the institution \$50,000 on condition that a like sum is raised by the trustees themselves. The trustees have raised \$25,000.

An order has been received at Fort Snelling, Minn., from the war department directing that the Second battalion of the Eight infantry be sent from Fort Snelling to San Francisco not later than September 6, whence they are scheduled to sail on the transport Thomas, September 16.

The puddlers, helpers and mill hands of the Diamond State Steel company at Wilmington, Del., received notice that they were indefinitely laid off until the mills resume running. It is estimated 1000 to 1500 hands affected.

St. Louis, Aug. 19.—Plans for the resumption of work on the World's Fair fund of \$5,000,000, which has been vexatiously interrupted, are under daily consideration by Chairman D. R. Francis and William H. Thompson of the two principal committees. Mr. Francis expects to sail for Paris about September 15th and hopes to have things in such
